A double by Allen, Buckley's sacrifice and Wagner's clout gave the visitors their lone tally in the third. The only other time they threatened was in the first frame. Here Wagner drove a scorcher to right. Lance Utt nabbed it by a spectacular catch, which was by far the feature of the game.
