A MYSTERY OF A CASE.

Shipped from Copenhagen to a Fictitious American Address.

New York, April 14.—The body of Meyer, the clerk who was murdered by his employer, Philipsen, a soap maker at Copenhagen, was found today at the New York custom house concealed in a cask of lime or plaster, which had arrived per steamer Thingvalla some time ago.

The cask had been shipped from Copenhagen January 18, consigned to "Bereford Brothers," Racine, Wis., Wells, Fargo & Co. were named as forwarders. The consignor prepaid the steamship charges and gave his name as William Smith. The cask was said to contain chemically prepared lime plaster.

On arrival here February 4, it was sent to the appraiser's stores and examined by the removal of the head and the scraping off for analysis of a few pounds of the contents. It was then reheaded and set aside to be called for. Wells, Fargo & Co. paid the duty of \$2.50 and wrote "Bereford Brothers" twice to remit bill of lading and the cask would be forwarded. The second letter was returned by the postmaster with the information that no such firm was known at Racine. Wells, Fargo & Co. then wrote "William Smith" at Copenhagen with no result.

When Philipsen confessed in Hamburg a few days ago that he had murdered Meyer and shipped the body to America from Copenhagen, the officials of the Thingvalla Steamship Company were notified, and today they called their New York agents to look for a cask shipped on the Thingvalla, January 18. The Danish consul here was also notified.

The agents, the consul and the representative of Wells, Fargo & Co., went to the appraiser's stores and had the cask opened. After digging away some of the plaster they uncovered a man's head and finally the whole body was exhumed. It was clad in plain clothing and was well preserved. The various parties engaged in the search at once dropped it, no one desiring to take charge of the body. Wells, Fargo & Co. said they were willing to stand their \$2.50 loss, and would put in no claim to the goods. The consul had no instructions to claim the body, and the steamship company is not interested. The appraiser will probably have to hold the cask and its contents until the Washington authorities direct its disposal.

STATE FINANCES.

Report of the Auditor for the Year Ending November 30th, 1889.

Raleigh News and Observer: We are indebted to the Auditor for a copy of his report for the year ending November 30th, 1889.

The general taxes of the State were \$467,784.50; of which land paid \$210,050.30, town lots paid \$63,694.20, merchants paid \$29,467.27, and marriage licenses \$4,119.84. Banks \$2,490. Railroads paid on property \$28,010.81, and on franchises \$3,482.42. With-out particularizing the entire amount of taxes received were \$629,920.90. This, however, does not include the fertilizers tax of \$37,500. Other receipts were derived from the N. C. R. R. \$162,012. Penitentiary earnings \$147,454.81.

The total amount received by the Treasurer was \$79,887.77. The disbursements were \$1,912,938.43. The total taxes which are payable to the county treasurers were \$679,944.04, while the county taxes were \$946,917.13. The entire taxes paid by the people for State, county, and schools were thus \$2,250,000. If city and town taxes amount to \$250,000 more, the cost of supporting government in North Carolina is about two millions and a half, say at the rate of \$1.50 per capita. There were 148,527 white polls and 65,594 colored polls listed for taxation. The valuation of land is \$105,000,000, of town property \$31,800,000, of personal property \$75,000,000, and of railroad property \$11,713,000, making a total of \$223,773,000. The above figures show an increase which is substantial, and indicate what we know to be the case, that except in those sections where the crop failures have been a drawback, the State is in a better condition than it was some years back, and county property is more highly valued.

STATE PARAGRAPHS.

Current Events and Incidents in North Carolina.

Alamance county has fifteen cotton mills, consuming, in round numbers, 20,000 bales of cotton each year.—The Roanoke Southern is finished to Ladd's Ford and regular trains will be running into Madison by May first.

Wilmington Star: The public generally will be glad to learn that the Orton will not be closed even during the summer months, as has been reported. A Star reporter interviewed Col. K. M. Marchison, the proprietor yesterday, and he authorizes the Star to say that the hotel will be run continuously.

Goldsboro Dispatch: Mr. Jonathan Edgerton, of Pikeville, had the misfortune to loose his barn and stables, about one hundred feet of shingles, five carts, one wagon, one buggy, a large lot of hay and all his farming implements, by fire, last night, and on which there was no insurance.

Mount Airy News: We believe the farmers of Surry are in better circumstances than ever before. They all seem to have plenty of money. One thing that has helped them is the good prices realized for their last year's tobacco crop.—The hail storm did considerable damage down the C. F. & Y. V. Wednesday afternoon. Several houses were damaged by the loss of window glass. At the Pilot Mountain the hail was almost as large as hen eggs, so we learn.

Rutherford Banmer: Geo. Jackson and Willis, Pickens, two negroes, became involved in a quarrel last Sunday morning, out on the works of the T. I. road, over a game of cards, which resulted in Jackson shooting Pickens through the back, inflicting a dangerous wound. Jackson was arrested by constable Hodge on Sunday night and brought before J. C. Erwin, Esq., who committed him to jail to await trial at the next term of the court.
