**Vegetables, Fruits, Eggs.**  
New York market review, reported  
for THE NEWS by G. S. Palmer, Com-  
mission Merchant, Fruits and Pro-  
duce, 166 Read street, New York,  
April 12th, 1890. The week closes  
with an active business in all lines  
of produce, and at very firm prices  
and with a favorable outlook for the  
immediate future on all vegetables  
that are to come forward of whatever  
nature. The recent scant supply and  
the lateness of the season, give it a  
special healthy tone to the market  
on all early vegetables. The supply  
of the old cabbage crop is exhausted,  
and for that reason the demand is  
large for new and prices have further  
advanced, choice South Carolina sell-  
ing at \$3 to \$3.50; and fair stock \$2 to  
\$2.50. Asparagus is selling at extreme  
prices, colossal up to \$10 to \$12 per  
bushel; prime South Carolina and  
North Carolina \$4 to \$6; culls \$2 to  
\$3. A few Charleston peas have ar-  
rived and sold at \$6. Receipts of  
strawberries have not been sufficient  
to meet the demands, and fancy North  
Carolina and South Carolina sell-  
ing at 75 cents to \$1; Florida 50 to 75  
cents. An increase is expected next  
week and prices will rule low. Re-  
ceipts of eggs have been excessive,  
aggregating 30,000 barrels and selling  
at 12 cents. A few Florida potatoes  
arriving and selling readily at \$6.50  
to \$7.50 per barrel.

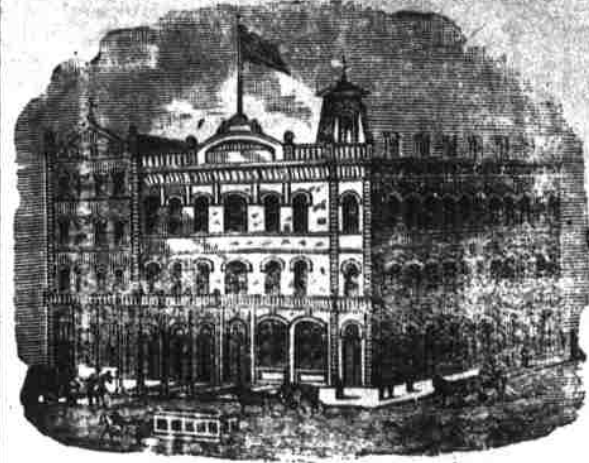
