FOR ELECTION ON ISSUING BONDS FOR IMPROVEMENT OFTHE STREETS OF THE CITY OF CHARLOTTE AND FOR THE GENERAL GOOD OF THE CITY.

An Ordinance submitting to the voters of the City of Charlotte the question whether bonds to the mount of \$75,000 should be issued for improving the streets and for the

Whereas the Board of Aldermen of he City of Charlotte, did at its meetng held on the fourth (4th) day of March, 1890, pass through two readings an ordinance requiring the suomission to the people of the City of Charlotte of the question whether the Board of Aldermen shall be auwithout rendering an equivalent to amount of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), for the purpose of widening, paving, macadamizing, grading and otherwise improving the died to the agricultural department streets of the city, and for the general good of the city. ing at the present meeting of the Board.
