Our Produce in New York.

Reported for THE NEWS by G. S.
Palmer, Commission Merchant,
Fruits and Produce, 166 Reade Street,
N. Y., April 19th: The week
closing today has been a most satis-
factory one on Southern produce.
Receipts generally have been light
and the demand active. Asparagus
is ruling firm and selling today from
\$4.50 to \$5.50; seconds from \$2 to \$3.
Cabbage rules very extreme for any-
thing that is strictly choice, and sold
green heads selling from \$3 to \$3.50;
and the outlook is favorable for con-
tinued high prices on choice grades.
I do not advise hurrying forward
anything that is not headed, as loose
stock is not wanted. Green peas and
other new vegetables will bring ex-
treme prices as soon as ready. Market
closes firm on eggs, and selling from
12 to 13 cents.

Strawberries have ruled very firm
until to-day. Receipts were much
heavier from Florida, and prices
have declined. Fancy Hoffman's sel-
ling from 40 to 50 cents and other
prime berries from 30 to 35; inferior
18 to 25. Heavier receipts are ex-
pected next week and prices will un-
doubtedly be lower.

Bonds or No Bonds.

To the editor of THE NEWS: I
shall be glad if you will grant space
in THE DAILY NEWS to say a few
words in regard to the bonds whose
issuance is to be voted on in May.
While some few understand the con-
ditions under which the voting will
take place, it is doubtful if the mass
of the people appreciate them. If
the old registration governed in this
election I should have nothing to
say, but this is not the case. A new
registration is ordered, and those in
favor of bonds will register, and are
registering fast to give effect to their
wishes; and those who object to the
bonds must register also, or the
bonds will be forced upon us. Most
business men comprehend this, but
mechanics and laboring men, we
fear, don't; and as an increase of
debt means an increase of taxes and
increased rents, it would be the part
of wisdom in those classes to weigh
well the consequences involved in
this bond question. The voting will
take place on 12th May, but registra-
tion must be attended to by 1st May
or the chance will be gone.

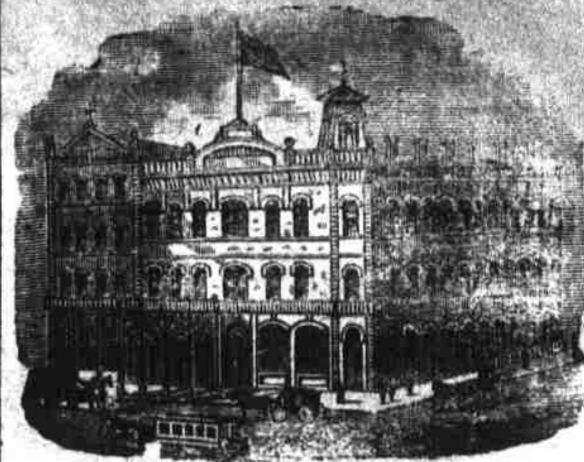
