INGALLS AND THE ALLIANCE.

President Glover Comes Out Squaring Against the Senator's Re-election.
TOPEKA, KAN., May 5.—In a letter published today in the Alliance Tribune, President Glover of the Farmers' Alliance of Kansas, comes out squarely against the re-election of Senator Ingalls. He says: "I claim that Ingalls in his interview has taken the right position on the Farmers' Alliance; but it is because he is cute enough to say the right thing, and everyone in Kansas knows that he said it simply to try to fool the farmers, not because he cares any more for the Kansas farmers now than ever. Deception is the only rule by which he works. He never has done anything for the Kansas farmer but look down on him, and if he were sent to the Senate fifty years yet he never would. Who ever heard of him doing anything, but he is always saying something, and there is quite a difference. He is no doubt lying in his interview, thinking his interview fooled the farmers of the State, but I want to say in this he is greatly mistaken. His earnestness for the farmer is the same kind he shows for pensions—all for effect, and sincere in nothing. I have wished a thousand times he was a different man, but he never will be."

GEN. LEE'S STATUE.

The Citizens of Richmond Will Draw the Trucks on Which it is Loaded.
RICHMOND, Va., May 5.—The work of unloading the Lee statue from the cars was begun here today. It will be placed upon four trucks. Each truck will have four ropes about 200 feet long. The veterans will have one rope of each truck, the sons of veterans a rope, the citizens generally will have a rope, and there will be a rope for the ladies, many of whom have signified their intention of assisting in the removal. The trucks will be drawn through the principal streets. This ceremony will take place on Wednesday afternoon. The boxes which hold the statue are in great demand. One scheme is to make a set of furniture from them and sell it to the highest bidder.
A prominent gentleman of this city has offered \$250 for the box containing the body of the horse and a portion of the figure. The boxes are guarded by policemen, who will remain on duty till its removal on Wednesday afternoon. When it reaches the monument it will be guarded by a detachment of veterans from the Soldiers' Home. The police had great difficulty in preventing relic hunters from cutting the boxes.

Down on Jones.

Greensboro Workman: The Gazette, published at Raleigh, in the interest of the colored race, is much displeased with Sam Jones, whom it characterizes as the great humbug preacher, for practicing on the colored people of Charlotte what it calls "deception." The specification of the Gazette is that the preacher requested that all who intended to stop stealing, lying and doing other mean things should rise up—that the whole body present rose up.
"This," says the Gazette, "was not an admission that they were guilty of the things which Sam Jones indicated, for the reason that the colored people . . . in their religious zeal at once arose, not thinking that a trick had been practiced on them by this man Sam Jones."
The Gazette will agree, however, in the opinion that if all the colored people had sat still and not risen up, it might have been taken to mean that they intended to keep on at the business of stealing, lying, etc. Evidently that congregation was in a predicament, a little worse than that in which the brethren found themselves who professed to have read the book of "H.zekiah." Our advice to every one is to be on the alert when Sam Jones is around.

A Smoking Tree.

Newton Enterprise: Newton has a curiosity that bears by a large majority the name tree, which gained such notoriety in Charlotte in 1886. It is a smoking tree, and baffles all efforts at explanation. It is a white mulberry tree, and stands on the sidewalk in front of the residence of Mr. Levi Yoder. It was brought from Illinois a year or two ago, and is now about twelve feet high, with a bushy top and many lateral branches. Last Sunday one of the family noticed a puff of smoke proceed from one of the limbs, and by watching it closely, puffs identical in appearance to cigarette smoke were seen starting every now and then from all over the tree; sometimes from the leaves, sometimes from the bloom, sometimes from the bark of the limbs, or trunk of the tree. The puffs are at irregular intervals; sometimes two or three at once from various parts of the tree, and sometimes they are several seconds or a half minute apart.

Colonel Cookerill Put Up the Cash.

NEW YORK, May 5.—Col. John A. Cookerill, associate editor of the New York World, appeared at general sessions court today and furnished the \$1,000 bail required in the criminal indictments in the matter of Henry Hilton and the late A. T. Stewart. He gave bail in cash.

In London, on Sunday, the various
