Something About the two Big Gatherings in Washington.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—The present week in Washington will be a notable one for the women of the country. Two gatherings, at which matters of interest to womanhood will be discussed, are to take place during the week at Albaugh's Opera House. The first of these gatherings is the first triennial meeting of the Women's National Council of the United States. Its regular sessions will begin to-morrow and continue Tuesday and Wednesday, with two or more sessions each day. A large number of the prominent women of the country are here to attend the meetings of the council and many subjects will be discussed. Thirty-five organizations of women will be represented.

Preliminary opening exercises of a religious nature were held to-day and were attended by a large number of people. A long time before the hour of meeting, the opera house was filled and many persons were unable to gain admittance. The services were conducted entirely by women. Four women ministers participated, three of whom are settled as pastors over churches. They are Revs. Caroline J. Barrill, of Michigan, who offered prayer; Ida A. Hilton, of Iowa, who delivered the sermon, and Rev. Anna Garlin Spencer, of Providence, R. I.

Rev. Anna H. Shaw, the national lecturer of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, announced the collection with true Methodist fervor, and Mrs. Margaret Bottoms, president of the King's Daughters, made an eloquent exhortation for a broader spiritual life for women.

The general subject for discussion at to-morrow morning's session will be charities and philanthropies. To-morrow evening the topic will be women in the churches. To-morrow morning papers will be read on the subject of temperance, to be followed Tuesday by reading of papers on education. On Wednesday three sessions will be held. At the morning session the political status of women will be taken up, to which papers will be read, and at the evening session the organized work and life of women. The extra session of the day will be devoted to consideration of miscellaneous topics.
