**Yesterday in Concord.**  
The county alliance met in the court house yesterday.

Diek Hunter, of Mecklenburg, was here with his gripsack full of agricultural information—head full also—and did address the faithful upon the all-absorbing topics of farming. A strange and altogether new feature in farming was discovered yesterday on a farm near Martin's Bridge on Rocky River. It was this: Half-dozen hands were busily picking cotton and in the field adjoining about the same number were planting cotton seed. This is progressive farming and this alone leads your correspondent to believe that this blending of going out and coming in seasons could originate only in the fertile and agricultural brain of our townsman John Wadsworth.

Richard Razor participated in the Alliance proceedings yesterday, but came out of the meeting too well drilled, to give away any of the proceedings. The meetings both morning and evening were private but the faces of those participating, showed upon adjournment that they discussed farming interests exclusively. Had politics entered into the matter at all you could have discovered the usual self-satisfaction grin on the faces of some and the try-to-grin on others.

The Dummy line has been steadily at work day and night moving the large amount of freight accumulated at Depot and by to-night they will be up with their work.

**The Jury Could Not Agree.**

In the case of Mr. H. Kirby Smith, a former student of the University of North Carolina, tried at Goldsboro, this week, the jury could not agree on a verdict and was discharged. The case is one of peculiar interest. The News and Observer says that the suit was brought by Mr. Kirby Smith against President Battle and Mr. Cameron, who was a trustee, charging malicious prosecution and claiming \$10,000 damage. It will be remembered that Mr. Smith was arrested the day after commencement, nearly two years ago, charged with painting the Caldwell monument in the campus with red paint. He was discharged and instituted this action. The case came up for trial at Wayne Superior court, Judge R. W. Winston presiding. The plaintiff allowed an abatement as to Mr. Cameron after his death and continued it against Dr. Battle alone. The defendant admitted in his answer that he was mistaken as to the guilt of the plaintiff in painting the Caldwell monument and the defense was that when the prosecution was instituted he had probable cause to believe him guilty. But his attorney Mr. Manning at his instance promptly dismissed the warrant as soon as it was returned that he was mistaken. The jury took the case Wednesday afternoon between 5 and 6 o'clock but failed to bring in a verdict that night, and yesterday about noon announced that they had failed to agree. It was discharged. The case will accordingly have to come up again at the next term of Wayne Superior Court.

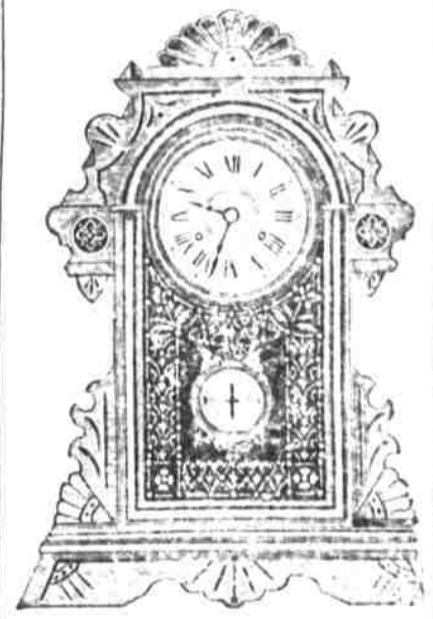
