A NEW THING IN WHISKY.

A Wholesale House Opens an Agency Here Following the Closing of the Saloons.

Things do not start out very encouragingly for those who expected to see Charlotte become a dry town upon the closing of the saloons. In the first place, the Porter Brewing Co., goes along with its regular business the same as if prohibition had never been heard of, and now P. R. Key & Co., wholesale whiskey dealers of Statesville have established an agency here. They have leased the room next to McCorkle's saloon, corner of Church and Trade streets and have placed Mr. John Alexander in charge of it, at a stated salary. The room is filled with samples of truck. A customer can leave his order with the manager for whatever he wants and have it delivered. In this way the prohibition law is surrounded and with two big leaks of the kind named it is not yet time to claim Charlotte as a "dry" town.

The vestibule yesterday unloaded here by actual count thirty-two 2 gallon jugs, and fifteen 5 gallon kegs.

RIVAL PETITIONERS.

Papers Being Circulated in the County Townships—They are Pretty Hot Even in the Country.

There are two petitions out, one looking to the ousting of the present board of commissioners, and the other looking to the retention of the board. Both petitions are being largely signed. They went all over Crab Orchard, and this morning they are going the rounds in Clear Creek township. The feeling in the county is said to be fully as intense as it is in town and growing "more so" all the time.

Rev. Frank D. Hunt.
 In releasing Rev. Frank D. Hunt, the new pastor of the Graham street Presbyterian church in this city, the congregation of Mills River church passed a series of complimentary resolutions. These resolutions show the esteem in which he was held by the Mills River congregation: "This separation, which is deemed providential, has caused pain amidst the congregation with which he has so faithfully labored, and formal consent to his resignation and acceptance has been rendered against the veto of the entire membership. There was not even no sign of rain anywhere, but not a cloud was visible. People stood about on the streets looking at the strange sights.

The Weather.

Following is a synopsis of weather prevailing at 8 a. m., to-day: One of the severest general cold waves is prevailing over the entire country, which bids fair to be of short duration. Warmer weather by 10 to 20 degrees is immediately west of the Blue Ridge mountains. A low barometer is developing in Texas, which will pursue a northeasterly course, bringing milder weather. Snow is falling at Detroit, Cleveland, Pittsburgh, North Patte. General fair conditions, however, prevail.

The Hunting Along the Pee Dee is All Right.

Yesterday was not a very good day for hunting, especially in the mountainous section of Anson along the Pee Dee, but Bob Gray and the field editor of THE NEWS braved the wind and weather in an attempt to depopulate the fields and woods that lay in their path.
