ORGANIZING KANSAS SOLDIERS.

A New Movement to Wreck the People's Party in That State.

TOPEKA, Kan., Jan. 7.—Several months since the name of Alex. Terrill of Harper county figured in many papers of the country. The republican press of Kansas praised him for having the courage to leave the Farmer's Alliance and people's party and his return to the republican camp. Alliance papers called him a traitor to the cause of the oppressed and denounced him for going back on his sacred obligations.

Terrill was one of the fourteen delegates from Kansas to the Ocala, Fla., national alliance convention. He mixed with the through there and got inside facts relative to the intention of southern alliance to keep the democratic ranks united. When he returned to the state he did not call on his friends and he did not rebel to his own will as his intention, but later he cut loose from his brethren and exposed their political hypocrisy. He took the stump for the republican ticket last fall and made a vigorous fight against the alliance. He was so enthusiastic over the result that he kept up the battle and has been speaking regularly since.

Terrill was a Union soldier, served four years under Sherman and participated in the famous march from Atlanta to the sea. Recently he has inaugurated a new movement, which, if successful, will greatly weaken the people's party.

Correct estimates place the number of ex-Union soldiers in Kansas at 85,000. It is estimated that fully 40,000 of these veterans went into the new party and voted with it in 1890. Mr. Terrill has conceived the plan of organizing a soldiers' association in every county in the State for the purpose of breaking into the alliance strength. He proposes to show them that the alliance men of the south are still Democrats and that they stand like a granite wall opposed to any and all pension legislation, and that therefore the Union soldiers of Kansas are voting with their enemies and against their own interests by adding the people's movement, which, in fact, is a Democratic aid society.

This must be so, or the Governor would not have to exercise the one-man power so often to set aside the verdicts of the courts. Something is wrong somewhere. Is it the criminal laws, or the incapable prosecutors, or the ruling of judges of the ignorance and corruption of juries? Where is the fault? Every few days the Governor is enveloped through petitions, so easily secured, to over-rule the findings of courts, and to change the punishment to pardon criminals. Is not something somewhere slightly rotten in North Carolina?

The Legislature might find needed work and quite important to do just here. The criminal laws, if defective, ought to be remedied. The law-abiding people ought to have some protection, however, against housebreakers, ravishers, incendiaries, murderers and rascals generally. If the laws are all on the side of crime and criminals it is high time they were amended. It is hard to hang a man in North Carolina today for the most brutal murder, than it is to convict and send to the penitentiary a negro for stealing an old hat or chicken.

Laws should never be vindictive, but they should give protection to the helpless and unprotected. A rigid but fair execution of law is a great desideratum always, in North Carolina particularly. The newspapers, that see much that is wrong, and watch the people's interests with Argus-eyes, are often complaining of the unjust rulings of judges, the inefficiency of the laws, and the endowments of the courts in the favor of criminals, the comparative safety of criminals, the dead failures of the antiquated, effete jury system and so on.

Not long ago our esteemed and wide awake Charlotte contemporary, the News, discussed "The death penalty for burglary." The action of Governor Holt in extending the term of a burglar was a disturbing matter among the Charlotte people. The feeling of disapprobation was profound. Here was a case in which a burly negro not only broke into a citizen's home, but who entered the apartment of a daughter of Mr. Wadsworth while she was sleeping, ransacked the room, and then desperately fought Mr. and Mrs. Wadsworth in the dark, and who refrained from stabbing Mr. Wadsworth only because at the last moment he succeeded in breaking through a window, is to escape the penalty of death.

It is surprising that many of the fathers and mothers of Charlotte should have felt unprotected? We have no patience with an unwholesome and sickly-romantic sentimentality favorable to scoundrels. No one has any right to enter any man's home under the cover of darkness. If he does break in or otherwise enter he does it for no good purpose, but for an evil purpose, perhaps even for murder as well as robbery. He does it at his own risk and apprehended and tried he should pay the penalty of his crime. That penalty should be enough to protect the homes of the people and to deter scoundrels from burglary and murder. The penitentiary gives no terror to scoundrels.
