NEWS BRIEFLY NOTED.

Cold weather in Texas is killing many cattle. Influenza is spreading in many parts of Europe. The resignation of the Portuguese minister was accepted. Chancellor Von Caprivi opened the Prussian Landtag.

Heavy fog on the bay has caused a short supply of oysters in Baltimore. The International League of Free Clubs began its session in San Francisco. Because of the illness of the Emperor, the official New Year's reception was omitted at St. Petersburg.

A horseburg, of Birmingham, a leading merchant of Alabama, has failed, with liabilities of \$100,000 and assets of \$125,000. Death Record of a Day. William C. Reger, chief judge of the court of appeals of New York, died at Syracuse, N. Y.

Gen. Charles Robinson, formerly secretary of state of Ohio, died at Kenton, Ohio, of heart failure. A. T. McClintock, the oldest member of the Luzerne (Pa.) bar, died, it was rightly said, at the age of 90. John Hamilton, father of Theodore Hamilton, the well known actor, died in Baltimore, in the eighty-third year of his age.

Famble Weir, superintendent of Pittsburg police, died of inflammation of the bowels. He was forty-three years of age. Dr. Charles Martin, medical director of the United States navy, on the retired list, died in New York. He was in the seventh year of his age.

Chief Garry, of the Spokane Indians, died at a very old age. There are only a few of his people left, and they have neither a reservation nor lands. Charles Augustus Aiken, D. D., Ph. D., Stuart professor of the relation of philosophy and science to the Christian religion and of Oriental and Old Testament literature in Princeton Theological Seminary, died.

The death is announced of Mr. Edward Whitley, member of the House of Commons for the Overton division of Liverpool. He was born in Liverpool in 1821 and in 1868 was mayor of that town. In politics he was a Conservative.

Henry Ingersoll Bowditch, M. D., died at Boston at the age of eighty-four. He was president of the American Medical Association in 1877. To Dr. Bowditch was due the discovery of the law of soil moisture as a potent cause of consumption in New England.
