The New York Life Insurance Company,  
Daily Stockholder, Broadway, New  
York, Jan. 23: The Insurance De-  
partment of this State issued yester-  
day the result of its six months' ex-  
amination of the New York Life In-  
surance Co. The report criticizes,  
and makes allegations against the  
management which will cause its  
officers much trouble and inflict  
great injury upon the company.

The spirit of the report is unfair  
and its tone unjudicial; but amidst  
all, two grand facts are admitted  
and one suppressed.

(1.) It is admitted that \$120,000,000  
assets must be credited as in the New  
York Life's possession, even after  
the examiner had pressed down and  
cut off every item, against the value  
of which an excuse or pretext could  
be found.

(2.) It is admitted that the surplus  
of the New York Life exceeds \$14-  
600,000 in good solid cash, notwith-  
standing assets were cut down by  
the examiner wherever possible, and  
liabilities raised to the highest notch  
in all cases.

(3.) It was not admitted in any  
formal language, and the existence  
of such a condition of affairs was  
suppressed, that not one dollar had  
ever been misapplied, nor that no dis-  
honest act was discovered as having  
been committed by any officer or  
trustee of the New York Life In-  
surance Company.

The policy holders and agents of  
the company, therefore, may set  
against the Insurance Department's  
adverse criticisms, its allegations  
that mistakes of judgment had been  
made—these three grand achieve-  
ments by the New York Life's man-  
agement: (a) Assets intact \$120-  
000,000; (b) surplus intact \$14,600,000;  
(c) the business integrity and finan-  
cial honesty of every officer and  
trustee, intact and unassailable.

The New York Life Insurance  
Company yesterday gave out the  
following, pending a further and fuller  
answer:

"Without at present going into  
particulars, we remark that the se-  
vere language of the criticisms is not  
justified by the facts as found—not  
one word of commendation for what  
is good in the very large and suc-  
cessful results obtained in a series of  
years to be found in the creation of  
one of the largest and soundest in-  
stitutions in the world. It is a nota-  
ble fact that, between January 1 and  
June 30, the assets have increased,  
as per company's report, from \$115-  
947,909.97 to \$120,710,000, as per su-  
perintendent's report.

"Notwithstanding the severe and,  
in many cases, very improper, deduc-  
tions from real estate values, and all  
other eliminations made by the In-  
surance Department, the company is  
allowed by the report a surplus of  
\$14,708,575, which is within \$190,000 of  
the amount claimed by the company  
January 1, and in this comparison no  
account is taken of the amount paid  
out as dividends between January 1  
and June 30, amounting to over  
\$400,000.

"Practically, the company has  
earned more than enough in six  
months to wipe out the deductions  
made from the assets by the In-  
surance Department.

"A copy of the report, as made, was  
given to the company until about  
Monday. It will be submitted  
to the Legislature on Monday for  
their consideration."

Attempt at Incendiarism.

Two unsuccessful attempts have  
been made today to burn the dwell-  
ing of Mr. John B. Bethune, on  
Clarkson street. Early this morning  
a small fire was discovered among  
some wood stored away under the  
rear portion of his house, but was  
easily extinguished before any dam-  
age resulted. The second attempt  
which called out the fire department  
this afternoon at 2 o'clock, proved  
more disastrous, and but for the tim-  
ely assistance of the neighbors the  
building would have been consumed.  
This time the fire was discovered in  
the wardrobe in Mr. Bethune's room,  
which was packed full of clothing, a  
large portion of which was badly  
damaged by water and fire. Evidence  
points to Mary Marshall, a small col-  
ored girl in the employment of Mr.  
Bethune, as the guilty party, but no  
reason can be thought of why she  
should attempt to burn the house.  
Mr. Bethune's little girl says that she  
saw the girl when she set fire to the  
clothing and ran out of the room. The  
little girl's story, although she is only  
about three years old, told in her  
childish way, is very convincing as to  
the guilt of the servant girl, and the  
police upon the evidence brought so  
light have placed Mary Marshall un-  
der arrest to await further develop-  
ments. The loss although slight will  
greatly inconvenience Mrs. Bethune,  
as everything is badly torn to pieces.
