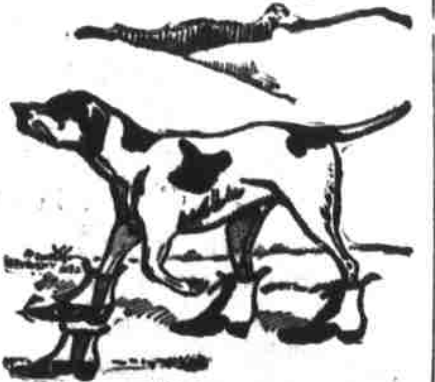

NOT SATISFACTORY.

THE CHILIAN PROPOSITIONS NOT CONSIDERED SINCERE.

No Apology to Such Intentions, and it is believed that the reply to Resolutions to Give Them—These May Yet Be Won.

WASHINGTON, January 27th.—Whatever may be the truth of the statements printed yesterday to the effect that the Chilean government had offered certain propositions to the United States looking to a settlement of the controversy, based on a cablegram from Santiago, the prevailing opinion around the department this morning was that Chili is scarcely sincere in her advances.

Naval officers are unquestionably disappointed over the prospect of a peaceful settlement, and they are inclined to doubt the genuineness of the information or its significance. Other observers, as well, who are less personally interested, are quite as confident in the belief that there is little or no reason for discontinuing the war preparations here to be found in the dispatch.

In the first place the proposition is almost universally assailed as containing no apology, as such. It is an offer to modify the causes for conflict as far as the Matia note is concerned, and yet, it is agreed, the offer is incomplete, in that it merely presents an excuse for its delivery to Met or Montt and the other Chilean agents on the ground of an error of judgment. A diplomat's attack of this government gave it as his opinion this morning that such a proposition conditioned by such an excuse does not meet the requirements of the President's demand for a full and complete disavowal of the note in such publicity as it was given on its presentation.

The second term of the "apology" is a withdrawal of the request for Mr. Egan's recall, but in the opinion of a great many observers who have studied the case closely this has little or no bearing on the issue, inasmuch as the President has already declined to recall the minister, and the request of the Chilean government to that effect has therefore not affected the attitude of the administration in the least.

The third proposition—to submit the Baltimore affair to arbitration—is not regarded as having any weight in view of the fact that Chili has placed herself unquestionably on record before the Pan-American congress as being opposed to the arbitration of all questions involving a point of national honor. The fact that the Chilean delegates to that body were from the government of which Balmaceda was head may afford a slight ground for a disavowal by the present government of the platform then laid down. In case such a disavowal is not made, however, competent authorities here consider that it would be altogether improper for the United States to consider any proposition looking to arbitration coming from Chili. The point in issue is one of national honor and is so regarded by the President, who, in his message to Congress yesterday, expressed it as his opinion that the attack upon the sailors of the Baltimore was less of an assault upon the men than upon the uniform they wore, and that the integrity and honor of the United States had, through them, been assailed.

The fourth and last proposition is thought to be the weakest of all, and indeed is being quoted freely today

as an indication of the lack of sincerity on the part of Chili. This is in effect a suggestion by Chili that, if the former proposition be unacceptable, the matter be submitted to the decision of the U. S. Supreme Court. Deep-thinking men regard this as either an indication of Chili's extreme ignorance of the laws of this country or else an effort on her part to cause further delay and thus gain time. A submission of such a question to the Supreme Court is everywhere pronounced to be simply impossible and its suggestion absurd. That a court of one of the nations involved should be made the means of settling an international dispute, while it may appear to be a fair concession by Chili, is thought to be so irregular as to be useless.

It is said that Senator Hawley, discussing the situation with a naval officer this morning, said that he regarded the propositions as an evident effort on the part of Chili to meet the United States half way and to be fair.

Yet, with all the criticism that is passed upon the dispatch and the propositions, it was agreed that in case the government of Chili has actually sent such a message to this administration the possibility of war has been wholly averted.

The proposition made in the dispatch yesterday, as coming from Chili, does not avoid the objection to first proposition. They propose now to recall the note, not because it is offensive, but because the sending of it was an "error of judgment."

This country they further say, is not considering errors of judgment as cause of war, and will probably accept nothing but an unequivocal withdrawal of the note as offensive and improper.

The weather. Following is a synopsis of weather prevailing at 8 a. m., today: An area of very high barometer is now central over this section—the cause of this cold wave. Temperatures within its influences have fallen 10 degrees to 20 degrees, this fall extending through to the Gulf and Atlantic coast. A low pressure is central in the extreme northwest, which is producing warmer weather by 5 degrees to 15 degrees. THE BRANK CHAIR RUCK.

An Electric Car Crashes Through the Carolina Central Passenger Shed, Crosses the Platform and Two Railroad Tracks and Starts up Against a Coal Shuttle.

There was quite an exciting accident at the Carolina Central passenger depot this afternoon, caused by the breaking of a chain on the brake of an electric car. The car was going down the grade to the depot at the usual speed, but when the motor man applied the brakes, a chain broke, and the car swept on with increasing speed reaching the end of the track at the passenger platform, it mounted the platform, crashed through the shed crossed two railroad tracks and brought up against a coal shuttle on the north side of the train yard, and on the brow of a hill down which the car would have gone tobogganing but for the obstruction. No one was injured, and the car was but slightly damaged. An extra car was at once put on and traffic was not interrupted.

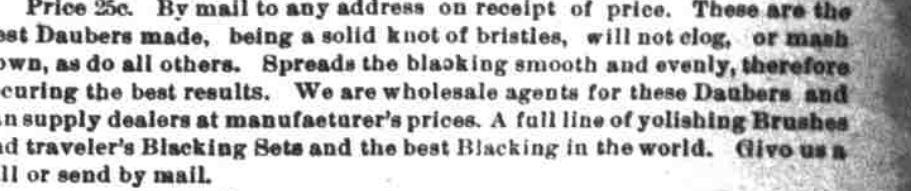
