**Rev. Sam Jones in Raleigh.**  
Rev. Sam Jones preached twice in Raleigh yesterday. The State Chronicle says that his theme in the forenoon was "The Love of God" and the text was the 16th verse of the 3rd chapter of John. In the afternoon his text was from 10th verse and 3rd chapter of Philipians: "That I may know Him and the power of His resurrection." Large crowds were present on both occasions and all the people heard him gladly. He preached in his own inimitable way, and exposed sin in all its deformity. His illustrations were unique and his illustrations a wayside rate. It was the first time the unique evangelist has preached in Raleigh, and here as everywhere else he made a favorable impression on most of those who heard him. There is a growing sentiment in favor of getting him to come to Raleigh and hold one of his meetings. He expressed himself as willing to come if the people would build a tabernacle large enough to hold 5,000 people. It can be built at a comparatively small cost for temporary use, but Raleigh needs a permanent auditorium for the purpose of such meetings and for all other great gatherings.

**The C. C. & A. Night Train.**  
A rumor has been current in railroad circles that to further lessen expenses, the Richmond & Danville Railroad Company proposed to take off the night passenger train between Charlotte and Columbia. THE NEWS can find no foundation for the rumor. It is not considered at all probable that any such action will be taken.

**The First Gun Captured.**  
A relic of the War Whose Proper Place should be in the Charlotte Museum.  
Mr. R. M. Stafford of Harrisburg, has in his possession a valued relic of the late war. It is the first gun that was captured by the Confederates in the war. From this fact alone, considerable value attaches to the relic. The history of its capture is well authenticated. Capt. Wm. A. Owens commanded the Hornets Nest Riflemen, Co. B., First North Carolina Regiment, at the battle of Bethel, and Col. Owens got the first gun that was captured from the Federals. It was the regulation musket. Col. Owens gave the gun to John M. Springs who in turn gave it to Mr. Stafford who has since treasured it as a valued relic. A News reporter was recently shown this gun by Mr. Stafford. He has facts to substantiate the claim that it is the first gun captured by the Confederates. That gun ought to have a place in the Charlotte museum.

**Teacher's Meeting.**  
Mr. W. Green Steele, the Charlotte City Editor of the Mecklenburg Alliance department of the Salisbury Watchman, is bustling about with a couple of sharp pencils. Mr. Steele is a stirring man, bold in his opinions, and Mr. Steele expects to see the Mecklenburg side of the Salisbury paper bustling with news this week. The Alliance department of the Watchman is on a college street.

**The Grand Jurors and Joe Lindy.**  
Mr. W. C. Maxwell went to Monroe yesterday on private business, and a report got out that he had gone there to see Judge Rynn about the matter of the refusal of the county commissioners to grant a license to Joe Lindy. This was all a mistake. Actions of that kind cannot be taken. Counsel for both sides must be there and make their pleas. So far no determination has been arrived at, Mr. Maxwell says, as to taking Mr. Lindy's case before Judge Rynn.

**A Doctor Sued for Damages.**  
Judge Rynn opened the spring term of the Superior court at Monroe, yesterday. There are no cases of any public interest on the docket for this week, but a right lively row is on hand for this week. It is the case of Mr. Crane vs. Dr. J. J. Roane, for damages. Dr. Roane is from Pineville, and horse-tipped Crane. This assault grew out of some slender suits previously called in Union court. Crane sues Dr. Roane for damages. This case will be tried with a great deal of interest.

**The Weather.**  
Following is a synopsis of weather prevailing at 8 a. m. to-day: A high barometer is certain this morning at Omaha, Neb., but its influence extends this side of the Mississippi river and is the cause of the clearing conditions which set in yesterday. Temperatures over this high area have diminished 10 to 15 degrees during the past twenty-four hours and are slowly working their way eastward. Light rains have occurred to the south of us during the last twenty-four hours but generally fair weather at present prevails over the entire country, with the exception of the extreme northeast, where now and generally four weather is in progress.

Continued fair weather is likely, becoming cooler by the morning.

**School Boy Burns a Building.**  
The people at Duluth, on the Air Line road, after hard efforts, finally succeeded a few months ago, in completing an elegant school building. About ten days ago an unsuccessful attempt was made to burn the building. A suspect was arrested. When the Charlotte bound train passed Duluth this morning, the school building was in ashes. It transpires that the building was burned by a boy, a son of a prominent man. The boy said that rather than be compelled to go to the school, he would burn the building, and on the second attempt he was successful. He fled from the town and has not been arrested.
