State Guard Affairs.

General Orders No. 1, by Adjutant
 General James D. Glenn, says: First
 Lieutenant W. E. Shipp, 10th Caval-
 ry, United States Army, having been
 detailed by the Secretary of War for
 special duty with the North Carolina
 State Guard, is hereby assigned to
 duty in the Adjutant General's De-
 partment, and will assist in the other
 departments whenever necessary.
 He will also instruct all officers and
 men of the State Guard in the new
 drill regulations and in small arms
 practice, visiting the several com-
 panies at their stations for this pur-
 pose. Company commanders are re-
 quired to use every effort to have a
 full attendance of their respective
 commands as possible whenever he
 may visit them, giving him all the
 assistance desired; and all officers
 and men are urged to render him a
 hearty co-operation in the perform-
 ance of the duties imposed upon him,
 and as an officer of the United States
 he will be obeyed and respected ac-
 cordingly.

In order to conform to the new
 drill regulation of the United States
 Army, Section I, Article VII, of
 State Guard regulations, is repealed,
 and the following substituted in lieu
 thereof:

"The regiment is the unit of organiza-
 tion in the North Carolina State
 Guard, and shall consist of not less
 than two nor more than three bat-
 talions. The officers of a regiment
 consist of: The Field Officers—One
 Colonel; one Lieutenant-Colonel;
 three Majors. Regimental Staff—
 One Adjutant, rank Captain; one
 Quartermaster, rank Captain; one
 Commissary, rank Captain; one Sur-
 geon, rank Major; one Assistant
 Surgeon, rank Captain; one Assis-
 tant Surgeon, rank First Lieutenant;
 one Chaplain, rank Captain; one In-
 spector of Small Arms Practice, rank
 Captain. Non-Commissioned Staff—
 One Sergeant Major; one Quarter-
 master Sergeant; one Commissary
 Sergeant; one Hospital Steward; one
 Drum Major; one Chief Bugler. The
 officers and non-commissioned offi-
 cers of a battalion consist of one
 Major; one Adjutant, rank First
 Lieutenant; one Sergeant Major.
 The officers of a company consist, in
 infantry and cavalry, of one Cap-
 tain; one First Lieutenant; one
 Second Lieutenant. In the artillery,
 of one Captain; two First Lieuten-
 ants; one Second Lieutenant. Non-
 commissioned officers of a com-
 pany are, in the infantry, one First
 Sergeant; four Sergeants; four Cor-
 porals. In the artillery—one First
 Sergeant; four Sergeants; eight Cor-
 porals.

Each regiment for the present will
 be divided into two battalions, to be
 known as the first battalion and the
 second battalion of such regiment,
 but in all regimental formations the
 battalions will be posted as prescribed
 in drill regulations according to
 rank of battalion commanders. The
 several companies of the regiments

are hereby assigned to the battalions
 as follows:

First Regiment—First Battalion—
 Companies C, D, E and G, Second
 Battalion—Companies A, B and F.
 Second Regiment—First Bat-
 talion—Companies A, C, D and F,
 Second Battalion—Companies B, E
 and G.

Third Regiment—First Battalion—
 Companies C, D, E and F, Second
 Battalion—Companies A, B, G and
 H.

Fourth Regiment—First Bat-
 talion—Companies A, B, D, E and
 G, Second Battalion—Companies
 C, F, H and K.

The Major of each regiment as now
 constituted is assigned to the com-
 mand of the First Battalion of the re-
 giment, the Second Battalion of
 each regiment will be commanded
 by the senior Captain of the re-
 giment, who will be promoted Major
 and commissioned to rank from date
 of this order.

**How the Cotton Mills Help the Local
 Market.**

Last week it was said, and with
 truth, too, that cotton was lower
 than ever before known. Since then,
 there has been a steady decline, and
 the market today is lower than it
 was last week. The market opened
 this morning ten points off. The lo-
 cal demand by the mills keeps up
 the Charlotte market, which explain-
 why the paralyzing 6 cents figure
 does not prevail here as it does
 on the road where buyers do not
 have the mill supply to look after.
 But for the cotton mills in and
 around Charlotte good middling
 cotton would not bring 6 cents per
 pound on the market today.

A Silver Model.

A silversmith of Monterey, Mex., is
 at work upon a piece of silver which,
 when completed, will be an exact re-
 production of the agricultural build-
 ing now being built on the ground-
 of Jackson Park in Chicago. It will
 be eight feet wide, will contain a
 quantity of silver, valued as bullion
 at \$10,000, and when finished will be
 valued at \$20,000. Lieut. Baker, the

 one of the most beautiful objects
 which will be sent to the exposition.
