A special from Madison to the Winston Sentinel says: This little village, usually quiet and barren of news, is greatly stirred up this morning, and the cause of it is all to Charles Seagle, the dashing young agent of the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railroad at this place, missing and his most confidential friends don't know where to look for him.

The suddenness of his departure might have occasioned quite as much talk if he had left the funds of his employees behind. But this was not quite convenient.

Seagle came to Madison about a year ago to be the agent of the C. F. and Y. V. and was also the agent of the Southern Express Company. He wore fine clothes, was a leading personage in the society of the village, was the favorite of the girls and an all-around jolly good fellow, with money that he spent freely. Last night he closed the office after his day's work as usual and disappeared.

No one seems to know how he left or what his destination. The funds of the railroad and express company that were in his possession are gone with him, but the situation is not known. Seagle's departure was not discovered till this morning. He usually meets the R. & S. to look after the transfer freight, and this morning the negro laborer at the C. F. & Y. V. station met the train with information that Seagle's whereabouts are unknown.

Seagle's salary was about \$50 per month, and the theory is that he lived beyond his means and drew on the funds of his employees to make up the deficiency and seeing that he could not much longer keep up this state of affairs decided to skip.
