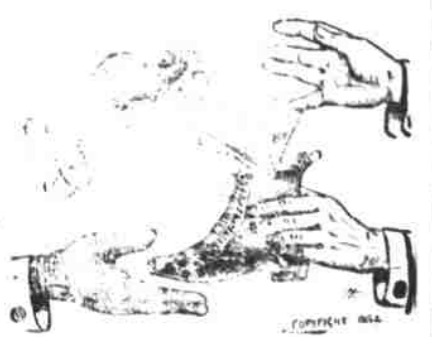

BILL AND CRIP TALK.

Recher. Subscribing Proceedings in Congress: Veto-Day—Vance Reports a Bill Adversely.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—SENATE.—Senators Hill and Bries were in their seats when the proceedings began today. Senator Cullum has not yet returned from his visit to Illinois. Senator Hear is still detained by sickness.

The Vice-President laid before the Senate Mr. Sherman's credentials for the term commencing the fourth of March, 1892, which was read and placed on file.

Mr. Vance, from the Finance Committee, reported back adversely a bill introduced by Senator Gibson, of Louisiana, to provide an income tax to pay pensions and salaries of postmasters. Mr. Vance stating that the Senate had not the constitutional power to originate such a measure. The bill was indefinitely postponed.

HOTEL.—Speaker Crisp was at his post of duty this morning, evidently none the worse for his temporary indisposition. Mr. Brown, of Indiana, from the Committee on Elections, submitted a report on the contested election case of Craig against Stewart from the 21st Congressional district of Pennsylvania. The report which finds in favor of the contestant was placed upon the calendar, and Mr. Brown gave notice that he would call it up for action on Tuesday next.

Mr. Tucker, of Virginia, from the Committee on Election of the President, Vice-President and members of Congress, reported a joint resolution proposing a constitutional amendment for the election of Senators by the people of the several States, it was referred to the House Calendar.

Meeting of the Ways and Means Committee. WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The meeting of the Ways and Means Committee was short and decisive this a. m., but final action was taken in this very brief time on three important bills, by a strict party vote. Mr. Springer's free wool bill, Mr. Bryan's free binding twine bill and Mr. Turner's bill placing cotton ties, cotton bagging and machinery for the manufacturing of the same on the free list. They were all ordered as favorably reported. These measures have already been published at length. The committee adjourned until to-morrow morning, when it is understood that Representative Corehan will call up for a favorable report, the bill reducing the duty on barley to the original rate which went into effect before the passage of the McKinley bill.

To Force a Third Party Tick. St. Louis, Feb. 16.—It is understood that Messrs. Simpson and Watkins, alliance members of Congress will attend the meeting of the alliance, here on Feb. 22, with the intention of forcing the third party ticket into effect. All southern members of the alliance in Washington are understood to be opposed to this scheme and Simpson and Watkins will go it alone. The scheme is to induce the meeting of the 22d, at St. Louis, to adopt a resolution favoring calling of a national convention of the alliance, at which nominations are to be made for President and Vice-President.

THE STATES JAMES VALER

The Beer House in Court: There Were 28 Indictments and 70 Convictions.

The most serious drawback to prohibition in Charlotte is the beer bottling establishment of the Robert Partner Brewing Company of which Mr. A. Valer is manager. The closing of the saloons did not affect the business of this concern at all and it has been going along under full headway ever since the commission was refused license to the saloons. This bottling establishment sells beer by the dozen bottles in Charlotte and has a big shipping trade besides. Mr. Valer was indicted in six cases in the Criminal Court today. In these cases the solicitor had indicted Valer in three counties. First, for retailing beer in quantities less than a quart. Second for retailing in quantities less than a gallon. Third for retailing in quantities less than five gallons.

There were two cases tried on each of which the States witness testified that within less than six months they had bought beer from defendant in quantities of one gallon and a half.

Messrs. Burwell & Walker and Maxwell and H. C. Jones, counsel for Valer insisted that he could not be convicted under the first count because he had not sold less than a pint—and that he could not be convicted under the last two counts because as to the offense of selling in quantities of more than one quart the offense was within the exclusive jurisdiction of a Justice of the Peace. The Court sustained these positions and directed a verdict of not guilty in the two cases tried, whereupon the solicitor rendered a nod pro in the other case against Mr. Valer.

Arm Broken at the Rink. At the skating rink last night Willie Eagle, clerk at the Central Hotel cigar stand, fell and broke his left arm just above the wrist. One bone was badly fractured.

Dilworth Improvements. The new pavilion at the park is progressing rapidly under the supervision of Major Burke, who has a force at work capable of completing the building in time for an early spring opening. The erection of this cozy retreat, to be, has met with the approval of our citizens, who cheerfully bear testimony to the good order and decorum of the colored people in their visits to the Park last summer, evincing no disposition whatever to make themselves obnoxious, or otherwise interfere with the rights of the whites. The car line will have ample facilities for transportation, it being the intention of the company to provide means for the largest possible gatherings at the park, and in the comfort going and coming. The directors have not discussed the subject of separation of races, by separate cars, as necessary for such a consideration as often every effort will be made looking to the pleasure of patrons.

There is a marked activity in lots at Dilworth, several real estate changing hands at a handsome advance on purchase prices.

Friend Cook, editor of the Concord Standard, dropped in on the News about press hour yesterday, but in time to give us a couple of good news items. Mr. Cook is giving the people of Concord a most entertaining little daily. The people over there would not know how to get along without it.

THE LOCAL NEWS.

At the meeting of the aldermen and commission from the school board last night it was decided as a way out of the difficulty to reorganize the school board by graded sections, and for building up and leasing of money obtained from this source the support of the aldermen. There may be objection to this plan but it was the best that could be done under the circumstances.

The C. & N. Road. The injunction against the Great Carolina & Northern railroads blocking its entrance into Albany has been discontinued and it is known that it would be. That it will soon be in regular operation between Monroeville and Albany. Then work will commence on a branch line from some convenient point along the C. & N. to Charlotte.

The Market. Following is a well merit of some of our local market, from the New York Herald World: "New enlarged with double the capacity and having every convenience of Buffalo, Charlotte, N. A Young Woman Found Dead. Miss Lou Downes, a young woman from Cabarrus county, was found dead in bed at a house on Dr. W. W. Orr's place, a few miles east of the city this morning. It was clearly evident that she died from natural causes but under very sad circumstances. She was 25 years of age, and was a step-daughter of Mr. Archie, who lives near Mooresville, and a sister-in-law of Mr. Hooper, who lives near Harrisburg.

The Commissioners and the Mandamus. Esquire Hilton, a member of the county commissions was in the city today. A News reporter asked him what he thought about the papers served on the commissioners by the sheriff, summoning them to appear before Judge Graves, next Tuesday. The Esquire said that he would be here on that day, and he supposed the other members of the board would be here also, as he understood they had been served with papers also. He did not know what would be done about it, as he had not seen a single member of the board since the papers were served.

The Weather. Following is a synopsis of weather prevailing at 8 a. m., today: The high pressure, which was located in Kansas yesterday has moved north westerly, and this morning central along the lower lakes; it has also extended southerly as far as the Gulf causing temperatures within its influence to drop 5 to 25 degrees. The heaviest portion of this cold spell is over the upper portion of the country, where falls of 20 degrees are reported. Warmer weather is closely following this cold spell, temperatures in the northwest having risen as much as 25 degrees since yesterday morning. A general absence of precipitation has prevailed over the country, with the exception of a small area in southern Texas.
