

MEXICAN BATTLE FLAG.

To be Received so that friendly Powers -- What was done in the Two Houses of Congress to-day. WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—Senate (Imme- diately after the reading of the joint resolution Mr. Sherman, from the committee on Foreign Relations, reported back favorably the joint resolution introduced by Mr. Perkins requesting the President to return to the Republic of Mexico. The battle flags now in the museum of the United States military academy which were captured by the army of the United States during the late war with Mexico. He said that it was an act of courtesy to a friendly power which had been suggested to congress by the American minister to Mexico and also by Mr. Curtis a gentleman connected with the organization of the bureau of American republics. The committee on Foreign Relations thought it a generous and proper thing to do for a friendly nation. Mr. Cockrell expressed his hearty approval of the joint resolution and it was thereupon passed.

Mr. Sherman also reported back adversely a resolution offered by Mr. Quay requesting the committee on Foreign Relations to inquire as to the practicability of the acquisition of certain portions of the republic of Mexico. It was indefinitely postponed.

House.—Mr. Stump of Maryland asked the unanimous consent of the House for the immediate consideration of the Senate concurrent resolution providing for the investigation by the Senate and House Committees on immigration of laws relative to the immigration and facts attending the admission of typhus-stricken Russians at New York.

It is said that the present 6 per cent bonds will be paid off in full in cash, and that the 5 per cent bonds will get 80 per cent of their par value in new 4 per cent bonds, 30 per cent in new income bonds, and a bonus in preferred stock.

The plan is further, to issue preferred stock of \$75,000,000 and common stock of perhaps \$150,000,000.

The Weather.

Following is a synopsis of weather prevailing at 8 a. m., to-day. The relative positions of the high and low areas of barometers remain unchanged; the high pressure is still around the lower lake region, where low temperatures obtain, and a feeble low is in southern Florida. Temperatures all to the west of this high area are slowly on the rise, but to the east of it they continue to fall slightly. The farther west we go the more pronounced becomes the rise in temperatures, having risen as much as 12 degrees in the extreme north-west. Very light rains have occurred along the south Florida coast, and, along the lower lake region; elsewhere there has been a marked absence of precipitation.

Death of a Good Man.

Mr. W. L. Cochrane, one of the most influential men of Mecklenburg county, died at his home at Back Creek, at 1:30 o'clock this morning, after an illness that had extended throughout a twelve month. Mr. Cochrane was 68 years of age and was widely known as one of the best men in the county. He was a prosperous and successful farmer. His wife and five children, all grown, survive him. He was the father of Mr. E. C. Cochrane, of the firm of Sims & Cochrane, of this city, and of Rev. W. O. Cochrane, formerly pastor of Steel Creek church, but now in charge of a church at Millersburg, Ky.
