GOOD FOR THE BATTALION. An Invitation Extended by Gov. Holt to this Company to be Present at the Launching of the Steamer Raleigh. Governor Holt has signified his desire that his staff and the officers and as many men of the Naval Battalion as can go, to accompany him and his party to the Norfolk Navy yard for the launching of the United States Steamer Raleigh, some time in April.

The cruiser is 300 feet in length with a breadth of 42 feet, having a displacement of 30,000 tons, normal draft. She draws 15 feet of water all round and 16 feet forward. The hull is provided with an aperture through which torpedoes can be fired. It is also provided with a stern chaser. It is mounted with six guns on each side.
