The Rainbow Fair Opened.

The Rainbow Fair at the Naval Battalion Armory, for the benefit of Thompson's Orphanage and under the auspices of the Orphanage Guild, opened at noon today. Big Fire at Elizabeth.

ELIZABETH, N. J., Feb. 25.—The plant of the Union Oil Cloth Co., at Elizabeth was destroyed by fire at four o'clock this morning. The flames had their origin in the boiler room and consumed the entire works, which consisted of frame buildings, occupying a block on Third avenue. The loss on buildings and machinery is \$40,000 and on material, raw and manufactured \$100,000. The company was a cooperative organization, composed of a dozen Philadelphia merchants and members of Knights of Labor who were locked out by their employers in that city six years ago. Table cloths were made there. There was no insurance.

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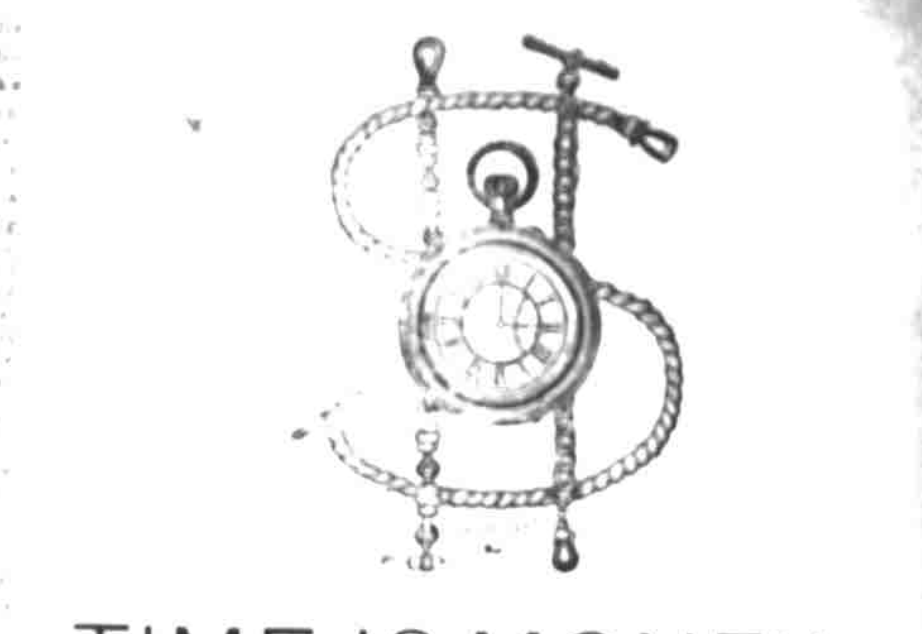
