CHARLOTTE'S CHAIRS.
A Little Help Given to Charcoal With the Honorable and Southern Road Chair.

It now appears to be a very easy matter for Charlotte to capture the Southern terminus of the Roanoke & Southern road. It may be done by helping Concord build a branch line to Charlotte.

The last Legislature chartered what is known as the Concord Southern Railroad to connect at any point on the Carolina central. A petition is now being circulated in Concord township, and is being almost unanimously signed asking for an election to be held in April for the purpose of subscribing \$250,000 as the cost of that branch line for building the road.

How the Political Outfit is Stepping in the State—Capt. S. B. Alexander will Very Probably be the Next Governor.

The recent gathering of the members of the Democratic State executive committee in Raleigh was the occasion of a comparing of notes from all over the State and from what was learned it is evident that a very completely equipped Alexander team has been rolling along under the surface, and gathering strength as it rolled, for some time past.

The developments are such as to indicate that Capt. S. B. Alexander is the coming man for Governor. It may be that this very combination will solve the political problem in this State and result in a thoroughly re-qualified Democracy and the triumphant election of the entire ticket.

There is no question about the fact that the gubernatorial question is a limited one and a very limited one. It is a question of a man who would be acceptable to all the people, but who is such a true Democrat and will whether for the party that he would not in unless it was clear to him that it was his duty as a Democrat to do so.

The Weather.
The following is a synopsis of the weather prevailing at 8 a. m. today. The center of the low which was located at Chicago, Illinois, yesterday morning has moved southwestward to Cincinnati, O. The effect of this high are felt over the entire section of the country lying east of the Mississippi river, in which there prevail clear and cooler weather. A remnant of a low weather remains off the extreme northeast coast of the country, where snow is falling at Boston, Mass., and Marietta, Mich. To the west of the Mississippi a low prevails over all that section which seems to be advancing quite rapidly east, bringing with it warm weather, as yet, there are any indications of low weather with this low.
