

Burglars are now operating in Concord. They broke into Jas. A. Cook's store last night, but were frightened away before they had secured any booty.

The committee appointed to wait on Senator Hill and formally invite him to be present in Charlotte on May 26th, will probably leave for Washington City Thursday night.

Mr. W. P. Byrum Jr., and Miss Mary Walker will be married in this city at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning at Rev. Jas. B. Cheshire. They will leave on the 2 o'clock train for Elizabethtown.

An Interesting Case.

Raleigh Chronicle: In the Superior Court yesterday argument began in an interesting case. The Atlantic express company, chartered at the last session of the legislature, brings suit against the Richmond & Danville and the Wilmington & Weldon railroads, to compel them to grant it facilities for carrying express matter. The company alleges that the railroads are common carriers alike. The railroads allege that they have not the car space necessary and that they have besides a definite contract with the Southern express company. The latter, the Atlantic company contends, gives a monopoly. E. H. Busbee, Esq., appears for the R. & D. railway; A. W. Haywood, Esq., for the W. & W.; while Messrs. O. H. Gouin and W. W. Clark appear for the Atlantic company.

A Mystery.

The Jury in the Mandamus Case voted 6 to 3, then 5, then 6 to 3, and were finally discharged.

Late yesterday afternoon the mandamus case of Roessler vs. the County Commissioners went off in a mistrial, a result that was predicted some days ago by THE NEWS. About four o'clock the jury went into court for instructions by Judge Hyman on the point as to whether if one commissioner acted arbitrarily, all were guilty. The Judge charged them that they were. The jury again retured but with no better result. They had come to the sticking point, and the Judge discharged them the case resulting in a mistrial. The first ballot the jury made was six for Roessler and six against him. But today, as THE NEWS stated the vote 7 to 7 for the commissioners and 8 to 8 for Roessler. Yesterday the vote changed back to 6 and 6 so it remained the six for Roessler were 6 T. Stowe, W. S. Clinton, W. D. Trower, M. Smith, G. W. Williamson and J. Owens. The six for the commissioners were W. M. Parham, W. W. Todd, W. A. Johnston, D. P. McCord, J. W. Brown and D. F. Grier.

The lawyers have not yet decided upon what step will be taken next. The matter will either be abandoned altogether and the costs compromised, or it will be tried again at the August term, of the Superior court which will be presided over by Judge Jesse Graves.

Mr. Stowe, one of the jurors, expressed himself freely after the jury was dismissed. He said that he was a member of Steel Creek Presbyterian Church, had signed the petition asking the commissioners not to grant license to sell liquor. After leaving the evidence and the Judge's charge he voted for Roessler all the time. He said that when he signed the petition he did not understand the law. He is a prohibitionist and says that when the issue is decided he will always vote for it. Every member of the jury is a prohibitionist.

To Attend the Launching

It has now been definitely decided that a detachment of 20 men of the Charlotte Naval Battalion will attend the launching of the cruiser Raleigh, at Norfolk on March 21st. The Hon. Nest Rifflemen and Queen City Guards will also be represented.

Justice to the Merchants.

The regular merchants about town who pay taxes and spend their money here, are complaining, and justify too, of the inroads of itinerant peddlers, to come and sell goods, and go, free of tax of any kind. The honest man does not only need protection from this class, but should have it. The peddler who comes along should be required to pay the same tax that the legitimate home business man does. This is a matter for the attention of the side-men, and they should take it in hand at once.
