The Richmond Terminal.

A dispatch from New York yesterday says: The directors of the Terminal, East Tennessee and Richmond and Danville roads met this afternoon. The principal business transacted was the resignation of Samuel Thomas, chairman of the board of directors of the East Tennessee. W. G. Oakman, being elected his successor. Mr. Oakman represents the Danville party or the First National party as it is generally called, and his election is the first step by that party toward assuming complete control of the Richmond Terminal system.

There was no other announcement made of any changes and the directors of the three companies adjourned until to-morrow afternoon, when the resignations of the Indiana party will probably be received. The plan of reorganization, which was expected to have been given out to-night, Mr. Thomas remains in the directory of the East Tennessee company.

Redistricting Bill Passed.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., March 16.—The lower house yesterday passed the Congressional redistricting bill as it came to it from the joint Democratic caucus. It will be passed in same shape by the Senate probably within its hours and then it will go to the governor for his signature. The bill provides for 14 Democratic and one republican district.

In the Senate To-Day. WASHINGTON, D. C., March 16.—SENATE—Senator Hall, from the Committee on Naval Affairs, reported for construction by contract of 3 battle ships of from 7,000 to 100,000 tons displacement, 2 armored coast defense vessels, 5 gun boats of 800 to 1,300 tons displacement, and 5 first class torpedo boats. If favorable contracts cannot be made the vessels may be constructed at the navy yards. Three million dollars is appropriated for their construction and one million for their armament, and \$200,000 may be expended in torpedo experiments. The bill was referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

The calendar was taken up and the bills disposed of as follows: To extend to the port of St. Augustine, Fla., privileges of first and seventh sections of a law for immediate transportation of dutiable goods. Passed. For investigation of claim for fuel used by the army from the property in Charleston, known as "Cameron Hill." Laid aside without action.

A War Incident Illustrated.

At the Confederate war song entertainment repeated in Concord to-night, to aid the monument fund, one of the scenes will illustrate "Woman's Devotion," an incident that occurred in Virginia during the war.

A Winchester girl, after one of the many battles that took place near there, hearing that her lover had been wounded and left on the field to die, went alone to find him. As night came on she was weary and had to discover no trace of him. At length she heard a voice at her feet calling in God's name for a drink of water. She stooped and raised a rebel soldier and reached a canteen near to give him the refreshing draught. As she did so a Yankee surgeon galloped by to whom she appealed for aid. He said the wound had ceased to bleed, but remarked: "When you put him down it will start afresh and he will soon bleed to death. I must fly for the enemy are upon us." Did she lay him down? And did he die?

You who have known and proved a Southern woman's devotion will not be surprised at the sequel. All night and day she sat by his side, his witness but tired and the angels who must have hovered near them, she supported the unknown and unconscious soldier until morning dawned and brought relief. The soldier was Randolph Ridgely, of Maryland, and the noble woman Miss Russell, of Virginia.

Will be Hanged To-Morrow.

VIENNA, March 16.—The Emperor has confirmed the sentence of death passed upon Franz Schneider, whose crime of shooting a woman and her child in the suburbs of Vienna and with the aid of his wife, Rosalie, outraged and murdered them that caused such a sensation in this city recently. The trial of Schneider and his wife, who was accused jointly with her husband, began January 25th, and continued five days. It resulted in the conviction of both of the and both were condemned to death. The Emperor who has a strong dislike to capital punishment, a woman not having been executed in the empire since 1828, followed his usual custom in this case and commuted Mrs. Schneider's sentence to penal servitude for life. Schneider will be hanged to-morrow.

Senator Morrill's Condition.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 15.—It is stated at Senator Morrill's residence at 10 o'clock this morning that there had been no material change in the Senator's condition since yesterday. He is conscious at all times and often asks questions of those about him. While his family and friends have not given up hope, yet all agree that he is in imminent danger.

White Caps in Mississippi.

JACKSON, Miss., March 16.—The planters in this vicinity are up in arms against a gang of white caps, who the other night took a negro named Williams from his house, tied him to a stump and gave him 300 lashes and ordered him to leave town. The planters fear the effect on the rest of the colored people.

SECRET REVENUE LABORER.

Close of the Spring Term of the Superior Court Four Interoceanic Cases The Appeal in the Bonner Case.

The three weeks term of the Superior Court for Mecklenburg county was ended yesterday. During the term, seventy nine cases were tried. Of these eleven were jury trials, and of the eleven jury cases, four were suits for divorce. A divorce suit in Mecklenburg is a very rare thing and at no previous term has there been so many on the docket. Gray Toole was granted a divorce from Laura Toole, but an appeal was entered. Martin E. Orr, Jr. was granted a divorce from Charlotte Orr and Jane McConline was granted a divorce from Frank McConline. All three of these cases were called. Nellie J. Reeves was summarily granted an absolute divorce from Jas. A. Reeves.

The B-wheeler mandamus case was appealed to the Supreme court, the following being the entry made on the docket. The plaintiff moved for judgment upon the pleadings. The motion was denied and the plaintiff excepted. The plaintiff demanded a trial by jury. At the conclusion of the evidence the plaintiff again moved for judgment upon the pleadings and the admission of the defendant. Motion refused. A bill of costs was entered. An appeal was thereupon taken by the plaintiff to the Supreme court.

Mr. Wilson Applies for License.

Interest in the same matter will be revived in the morning when the commissioners will probably pass upon the application of Mr. T. J. Wilson for license to sell whiskey in Charlotte. Mr. Wilson is a countryman and has what is ordinarily known as a good character. Whether he can prove that before the commissioners remains to be seen. Mr. Wilson filed his application through his counsel, Osher & Mearns, well this morning, but up to a late hour this afternoon the commissioners had not set any particular time for hearing the application.

Local Weather Report.

Following is a synopsis of weather prevailing at 8 a. m. to-day. The high and low pressures appear in the same portion of the country in which they appeared yesterday morning, in the extreme northwest and in east Texas, respectively. The non-movement of these areas indicate that the present conditions will likely continue. The cold wave which was noticed in the northwest yesterday is extending quite rapidly east, and this cold spell is likely to continue. On the south of the high pressure there is a pretty general fall of snow; snow is also falling on the upper Atlantic coast and at New-Haven, Conn. In fact, there is more of this precipitation than at any time during the winter.

The Alliance Programme.

Mr. Harry Skinner, who, it is understood, will be a candidate for lieutenant-governor, has given his ideas of the alliance programme. He says: "The third party movement will cut a small figure in North Carolina. The Alliance Democrats will control the State convention, nominate a State ticket and adopt a State platform with the sub-treasury plank as a prominent feature, and name the delegates to the national Democratic convention. The third party business would lose us the State, make negro rule a possibility result in the election of a Republican President. The delegates to Chicago will be un-instructed, but they will be representative Alliance men—for instance, such men as Hon. S. B. Alexander, a member of Congress from Charlotte district. They will represent and emphasize the anti-Cleveland sentiment in the State, and I mention that because it is the accepted opinion among the Alliance people that Mr. Cleveland cannot carry the State. They will effect, if possible, the nomination of a free silver candidate for President. The Democratic nominee must stand squarely on the question if he expects to carry the electoral vote of North Carolina. I have only to add that if the Democratic leaders in North Carolina believe as they talk the next State convention will give them the biggest surprise they ever had."

Fields to go to the Asylum.

NEW YORK, March 16.—Judg Van Brunt to-day handed down his decision in the case of the financier Edward M. Fields. He says he is not fully satisfied as to the sanity or otherwise of Mr. Fields. He thinks however, that Mr. Fields is not in condition mentally speaking, to plead in any case and that he should be confined in the state asylum. This was ordered with injunctions that Field be kept in such a place until the question of his sanity or insanity is fully determined.
