The Richmond Terminal.

A dispatch from New York yesterday
says: The directors of the Ter-
minal, East Tennessee and Richmond
and Danville roads met this after-
noon. The principal business trans-
acted was the resignation of Samuel
Thomas, chairman of the board of
directors of the East Tennessee. W.
G. Oakman being elected his suc-
cessor. Mr. Oakman represents the
Danville party of the First National
party as it is generally called, and
his election is the first step by that
party toward assuming complete con-
trol of the Richmond Terminal sys-
tem.

There was no other announcement
made of any changes and the direc-
tors of the three companies adjourned
until to-morrow afternoon, when
the resignations of the Inman party
will probably be received. The plan
of reorganization, which was expect-
ed to have been given out to-night,
Mr. Thomas remains in the directory
of the East Tennessee company.

Redistricting Bill Passes.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., March 16.—
The lower house yesterday passed the
Congressional redistricting bill as it came to it from the joint Demo-
cratic caucus. It will be passed in
substance by the Senate probably
within 48 hours and then it will go to
the governor for his signature. The bill
provides for 44 Democratic and one
republican district.

In the Senate To-Day.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 16.—
Senate—Senator Hall, from the
Committee on Naval Affairs, report-
ed for construction by contract of
8 battle ships of from 10,000 to 100,000
tons displacement, 1 armoured coast
defence vessels, 5 gun boats of 500 to
1,200 tons displacement, and a first
class torpedo boat. If favorable
contracts cannot be made the vessels
may be constructed at the navy
yards. Three million dollars is ap-
propriated for their construction and
one million for their armament,
and \$400,000 may be expended in tor-
pedo experiments. The bill was re-
ferred to the Committee on Appropria-
tions.

The calendar was taken up and the
bills disposed of as follows: To ex-
tend to the port of St. Augustine
privileges of first and seventh
sections of a for immediate trans-
portation of dutiable goods. Passed.

Will be Hanged To-Morrow.

VIENNA, March 16.—The Emperor
has confirmed the sentence of death
passed upon Franz Schneider, whose
crime of decoying servant girls to his
home in the suburbs of Vienna and
with the aid of his wife, Rosalie, outraged
and murdered them that caused such a
sensation in this city recently. The trial of Schneider and his wife, who was accused jointly
with husband, began January 26th,
and continued five days. It resulted in the conviction of both of
the and both were condemned to
death. The Emperor who has a
strong dislike to capital punishment,
a woman not having been executed
in the empire since 1808, followed
the usual custom in this case and
commuted Mrs. Schneider's sentence
to penal servitude for life. Schneider
will be hanged to-morrow.

Senator Morrill's Condition.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 16.—It is stated at Senator Morrill's resi-
dence at 10 o'clock this morning that
there had been no material change
in the Senator's condition since yes-
terday. He is conscious at all times
and often asks question of those about
him. While his family and friends
have not given up hope, yet all agree
that he is in imminent danger.

White Caps in Mississippi.

JACKSON, Miss., March 16.—The
planters in this vicinity are up in
arms against a gang of white caps,
who the other night took a negro
named Williams from his house, tied
him to a stump and gave him 300
lashes and ordered him to leave
town. The planters fear the effect
on the rest of the colored people.
