ALBACERED BOOK.

Will Cause a Portion of the Front of the City Hall to be Taken Down, and Be Built.

Mr. Norman, the architect of the new city hall building was here a few days ago and made a thorough inspection of the work, so far as it has progressed. As a result of his inspection, a small portion of the rock work forming the main entrance to the hall will have to be taken down and rebuilt. The trouble lies in the big stone over the front door. The stone weighs several tons and the most conspicuous architectural feature of the building, so going over the work the architect found that this stone is cracked and will have to come out. To replace it with a new and perfect stone, it will be necessary to tear down some of the work already in place. The stone is not only a large one, but is ornately carved, and to have a new one cut at the quarry will cause a still further delay in the completion of the building.

Mr. Norman said that with this exception, there is not a flaw about the building. He says that it is an exceedingly well constructed building and is perfect, in every respect.

Local Ripples.

Seventy six bales of cotton were brought to the city by wagon today.

— Mr. Albert Davis of New York, a brother of Mrs. Joe Branch, arrived in the city this morning.

Mr. H. Barnard returned from the North this morning where he has been to purchase his spring stock.

Dr. Williams, the colored physician is arranging to open a drug store on East Trade street.

The front of Mr. Jas. Harty's old place is being torn down to-day to give way to a new and modern one.

— The State Y. M. C. A. Convention adjourned at Greensboro Saturday. The next annual convention will be held at Winston.

— The New York cotton market took another tumble this morning opening ten points below Saturday's close. No special reason is assigned for so great a falling off.

A meeting of the Naval Battalion will be held to-night to ascertain how many of the members will go to Norfolk to participate in the launching of the Raleigh.

The masquerade carnival at the starting rink to-night looks fair to be a big success. A large number of spectators will be on the floor, and it will be worth seeing.

— Mr. J. H. Hunter is building a six room cottage on North Church street for Mr. William Davidson. Mr. H. I. Bingham has purchased the adjoining lot for \$600, and will build a two-story residence on it.

— The committee of arrangements appointed at the meeting last week to look after the affairs of the 20th May celebration will hold their first meeting in Dr. Brevard's office this evening at 8 o'clock.

— Mr. Geo. F. Basson has returned from Gaston court, which adjourned Saturday. There were no cases of public interest on the docket, only two civil cases being tried by jury. There were three cases of violation of the Gaston county liquor law, and the defendants got from three to six months imprisonment.

— The funeral of the late Jacob Duls was conducted at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon from St. Mark's Lutheran church. The esteem in which the deceased was held by the community was attested by the large crowd in attendance. Dr. Bowman conducted the services, and the body was interred in Elmwood.

— Our base ball enthusiasts should strain every point to keep alive the enthusiasm which has been made manifest in Charlotte in the past week. Charlotte should have a good club and no opportunity for furthering this end should go unnoticed. Now is the time to strike while the iron is hot, and if we can secure a good team why should we not do it?

It Will Be a Boner.

The committee on "reduced rates" of the May 20th celebration is now at work with the leading railroads of the country in securing the lowest possible schedule for travel to and from Charlotte on that occasion. Rollins said to be Missing an Alger Bonus. Mr. McDonald and Mr. Mott Boston to Asheville to interview the collector.

Politicians were considerably interested late Saturday afternoon when it leaked out that Mr. Ed. McDonald, deputy collector from this district, had received notice to have his office in shape to turn over to his successor not a negro named Henderson of Cabarrus county on April 1. The notice was by no means considerated an April fool was manifested from the fact that collector McDonald and Mr. Marshall, most popular of Mr. Ashevillians Saturday evening, to see Collector Rollins about the matter. They are there today, and it is intimated that as a result of their visit the order revoking McDonald may be suspended. Rollins was made collector through Dr. McRae influence, and McDonald was a B. H. Appleton and a Mott man. It is said that the removal of Mr. McDonald was brought about through the influence of the Hayes faction, and shows plainly the desire of that crowd to capture the negro vote.

This displacement of deputy, Mr. McDonald has given rise to the belief that collector Rollins has been converted to Alger. This conversion was brought about by the influence of Clarkson who has been in Asheville and who is using money to get up a crowd of Alger delegates from North Carolina. Dr. Mott will have an opportunity now to show his fine hand in straightening out his sections tangle and in getting everything well in line again.

They are Scalp Taking Now.

The battle between the Republican factions of Charlotte is growing beautifully fierce every day. The Brady faction got the first scalp, that of collector McDonald, and they are now reaching for two others—Gordon's and Cannaday's. One who is on the inside says that these two scalps will soon be called for.

A Valuable Contribution.

Col. J. A. Barnhardt of Pioneer Mills, Cabarrus county, who was a conscripting officer in the Confederate service, preserved all these now valuable records. He proposes to turn over to the Lydius' Memorial Association of Concord. In these papers will be found the name of every Confederate soldier of Cabarrus county, date of enlistment, and length of service, township, and Co. Dr. C. W. Payne and Mr. Jesse A. Willeford have been invited to inspect these records and will no doubt find many items of interest to the old soldiers and to southerners generally.

The syndicate which purchased the Keeley cure franchise for this State met in Durham last Saturday, and perfected an organization. The capital stock of this company is \$200,000, with the privilege of increasing if necessary. Many of the most substantial citizens are on the list of stockholders. This fact will insure the financial success of the enterprise. The following officers were elected: W. H. Osborne, president; J. E. Slaughter, cashier, of Fidelity Bank; treasurer; W. H. Eller, manager; Dr. W. J. H. Durham, chief physician. The Board of Directors are W. H. Osborne, Leo D. Heartt, A. K. Umstead, J. B. Warren, J. E. Slaughter, W. W. Fuller, counsel. The institute will remain in Greensboro for the present.
