The following is a synopsis of the weather prevailing at 8 a. m. today. The low pressure which was over this section yesterday morning, appeared this morning in the extreme north-eastern portion of the country, and is working its way northeast. Clearing weather has set in over the entire country, due more directly to the advent of a very high pressure in the extreme northwest, but which dominates the weather of the whole country. Temperatures over the whole country have diminished greatly, except for a very limited portion of the northeast affected by the low. Temperatures are below the freezing point by 15 degrees in the northwest, and the cold spell extends nearly through to the Gulf.

Methodist State Educational Conference

The Methodist State Educational Conference which is to convene in Charlotte next week will draw here many prominent educational men. The conference will be convened next Tuesday night and will continue on Thursday night. The opening address is to be delivered by Dr. Warren A. Candler, president of the Faculty and Henry College of Georgia. Dr. Candler is a comparatively young man. He was in charge of the Methodist church in Nashville four or five years ago, on the memorable occasion when Emma Abbott attended service there and when she created a sensation by rising up in church and replying to the preachers remarks on addresses. Other prominent men who will be here are: Dr. Carlisle, president of Wake Forest College, at Spartanburg; Rev. Dr. J. B. Shearer, president of Davidson College; Dr. John F. Crowell, president of Trinity College; and Dr. Atkinson, of Virginia. A great many other well known educators will also attend the conference. It will probably be the largest gathering of educational lights that has yet been known in this State.

Speech of the Representative from this District in Congress

The "free wood" debate on the House last Wednesday was a most interesting affair. Among those who had remarks to make was aptly R. H. Alexander representative from this district. Mr. Alexander, addressing the chair, said: "I have listened with a great deal of attention to the arguments which have been submitted in favor of free wood, and I confess that it seems to me that the principle does not stand quite with regard to wood that is the principle of incidental protection. It does not hold good with regard to anything else. I can not see why the wood grower and the vast majority of the farmers of this country more or less directly or indirectly interested in wood growing, why that article in which they are interested should be put upon the free list and at the same time protection be given to the manufacturers. The argument used for giving the wood to the manufacturer is that he may produce cheaper goods. If that is true it will give him cheaper material, and to give him cheap wood you must reduce the price of the product of the farmers of this country. There is no question of that. There is no escape from that position. I have figured the thing from every standpoint and I cannot find a rule of the material that would give an advantage to the New England carpet bagger's rule of duty in the tariff when he undertakes to take the tariff on wool and flax."

McLean's Tale All Buncombe.

Sheriff Smith's reputation as a watchful jailer, has been jeopardized by the statements of the fellow McLean, who stayed in jail because he knew bond was forthcoming. McLean's talk was published at length, but it bore fashod on its face. The News took no stock in his statement that Patterson had been at the jail walls for 10 days. Since Patterson was returned to jail he says that McLean didn't know anything about it. Patterson says that the entire work was done in one afternoon and half of the following night.
