

A SERMON TO THE KNIGHTS.

An interesting sermon at the Free Street Methodist Church last night.

The newly re-modeled Tryon street Methodist church last night had its largest audience, the occasion being a sermon to the Knights of Pythias, by the pastor, Rev. Dr. W. H. Creasy. The Knights, nearly 100 in number, attended in a body. The church was filled to its greatest capacity, all the seating and standing room being taken while crowds filled the doorways. Dr. Creasy took his text from 1st Peter 2:11, his theme being "Duties and Privileges."

I. Honor all men. We are a common brotherhood. Descended from the same parents, should consider all men as worthy until proven otherwise. Help all who are in need as far as we can. This refers to the first petition on our shield, F. & F. leadership.

II. Love the brotherhood. This refers to the second letter on our shield, charity which is love. We must honor all men, but above the brethren. "A new commandment I give unto you that you love one another." Notable incidents of love Joseph, Ephraim, David and Jonathan the true friendship of love upon which this order was founded, Damon and Pythias. Damon sentenced to die on a certain day. Asked Damon of Pythias to let him visit his family. Granted his hostage could be found. Pythias volunteered to stand as his friend's place. The king visited him in prison and asked him, "Did not he believe in the innocence of friendship?" Pythias pressed his wish to die. The fatal day arrived. Damon sat on a moving chariot drawn by six white horses. Pythias mounted the scaffold and calmly addressed the spectators. My master is here, the gods approve him. The winds have been contrary to me yesterday. Damon could not come, he could not conquer. Impossibilities, he will be here tomorrow. All have reasoned the life of my friend.
