Wrightson Avery and the Mecklenburg Independence.

It has been thought by many that Wrightson Avery took the name of Captain's attorney in the absence of John Dunn, and therefore would not have signed the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence on May 10 of that year. Fred A. Johnson examined the records of attorneys last Saturday and found that John Dunn was the attorney chosen. Being sick at the time when the main Boston Beagle was killed, he sent for him. Dunn and Boileau were Tories and were appointed attorneys and taken to represent the two companies used. In August, 1861, John Dunn was selected to represent the Charlotteans in the absence of John Dunn. He definitely advised that on November 10, he would be prompt to file his suit. If he had taken the suit, it would be August 10, 1861, when the case would be necessary to appear before the court at the same place in November, 1861, and not customary for attorneys to do so. It forms the Mecklenburg Declaration to take the suit. John Dunn was also claimed that Dr. J. M. Alexander, Herkimer, N. Y., was Adam Alexander, signer of the Declaration. We present the June term and at the particular date when they could not have done had they put their names to the document on May 10, 1861. The records show that they were fined \$100 dollars each for being absent. A judgment for that sum will be entered against them. ***
