The remainder of his party will consist of M. W. Bannon, of North Carolina; Wm. F. Vines, of Wisconsin; Geo. Gray, of Delaware; M. C. Butler, of South Carolina; A. H. Colquitt, of Georgia; James K. Jones of Arkansas; Congressman W. H. Estey and Jas. E. Wheeler of Alabama; Amos J. Cummings and W. B. Coker of New York; W. H. Hart of Missouri; W. H. Hoffman of Indiana; W. C. F. Breckinridge of Kentucky; J. F. Pugh of Virginia; C. H. Page of Rhode Island. Besides these the majority of the North Carolina delegation will be of the party. The guests will be entertained at the Buford and Central hotels.
