Local Weather Report.

The following is a synopsis of the weather prevailing at 5 a. m., today. The low pressure which was located around the upper lake region yesterday morning has moved slightly northwesterly, and is central this morning near Chicago. There is scarcely a portion of the country which has not been visited by rain during the past 24 hours, caused by the existence of this low to the north of this section. This low will pass quite rapidly to the northeast, and will be succeeded by an area of high pressure which now appears in the eastern portion of Texas, and which will cause another spell of clear and settled weather over this section. Temperatures have very generally fallen over the whole country, and a very cool weather is in progress in the extreme northwest.

ALL STARTS OFF WELL.

THE BIG CELEBRATION TAKES ONING IN THE SPECIAL PULLMAN CAR.

To Morrow is the great day for weather, and July toward towards in the city.

The second day of Charlotte's celebration of the 117th anniversary of the signing of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence opened this morning in as good a style as the heart of the most ardent patriot could have desired. Last night there was a refreshing shower of rain which laid the dust and this morning broke with bright sun and clear streets and cool refreshing air. Better conditions for a pleasant celebration could not have prevailed and all the indications point to pleasant times in Charlotte tomorrow, the great day of the celebration. Already the city is crowded, but tomorrow there will be an overflow. As announced elsewhere Senator David Hill and party are en route and will arrive here at 2 o'clock to night. The first thing on the program tomorrow is the gun club shoot. That will be followed by the sham battle, in which 13 companies will participate. After the battle, Senator Hill will be escorted to the auditorium, where he will deliver his address. In the afternoon there will be ballroom ascensions, baseball games, and at night the great event, the coronation and ball. This latter ceremony will take place at the city hall.

Notes.

There are 200 military men in the city.

Already 1,200 visitors are registered at the hotels.

The military parade tomorrow will be the finest that has yet been known in the State, no previous occasion excepted.

The Richmond & Danville building on West Trade street, is very handsomely and appropriately decorated. The electric display of the D. A. Tompkins Co., on East Fourth street, is a beauty. The Fourth street side of their great building, nearly a block shows Thompson-Houston arc and incandescent lamps in prettily arranged designs.

The 4th Regimental Drum Corps came in today from Concord. There are 14 men in the corps and it will be one of the attractive features of the parade. Robt. Keeler is drum major.

The Cabarrus Black Boys, the Greensboro and Burlington companies and the Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry arrived in the city on this afternoon's train. The Shelby and Lincoln companies are also here.

The Fayetteville Light Infantry is a superb company and it wears the good old gray.
