In the target shoot yesterday afternoon, Mr. Brockenbrough won the individual prize. The Charlotte Naval Battalion captured the first prize in the team shooting, the winning team being Capt. R. R. Smith, George Brockenbrough, Warren Roark, George Howell and M. Alexander.

REMARKS OF THE NEWS. A Monument Arch Now in Order--To be Built of Stone, Iron and Aluminum. Some After Notes of a Great Celebration.

THE NEWS' enterprise in giving Senator Hill's excellent speech in full yesterday afternoon, was generally commended. A great number of extra copies was printed off, but the edition was short of the demand, having been exhausted within an hour after it came from the press.



The big arch over the square was regarded by citizens and visitors alike, as a fine thing, and the idea generally expressed is that it should be replaced by a permanent structure of stone, iron and aluminum. The design can of course be improved upon, and an expert in that line will be here shortly to draw up designs. One thing is certain, the signers of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence must have a monument or a commemorative arch erected to their memory before another year goes by.

Senator Hill and party left last night on the 6:30 train for the return to Washington. Before leaving, Senator Hill said to a NEWS reporter that he had very greatly enjoyed his visit to Charlotte. The diminutive horsetail nest from Cabarrus adorned the lapel of his coat, and in his car was a large and beautiful nest presented to the Senator by Esquire D. G. Maxwell. It shall have a conspicuous place in the ornamentation of my room," said the Senator.

Senator Gray won hosts of friends here. He is decidedly a handsome man, his manners are polished and his address chaste and elegant. "How have you enjoyed your visit to the city, Senator?" asked a NEWS reporter. "Very much, indeed," was the reply, "and I am glad of the good fortune that permitted me to spend the day in Charlotte. My visit has been a decidedly pleasant one." Senator Gray said further that Charlotte is one of the prettiest and most business like towns he has ever visited.

The beauty of the coronation event is still the topic. THE NEWS gives a cut representing the throne occupied by the Queen at the coronation. Senator Hill's carriage was the first in the procession. With him were Adjutant General Glenn, Mayor Breward and Mr. W. R. Tolliferro. In the second carriage were Senators Hanson and Gray, Judge Daniel F. Mc Mahon of New York, and Dr. John H. McAllen. In carriages following were Rev. Edward Mack, Col. William Johnston, Mr. E. H. Springs, Hon. Elias Carr, Congress man Hayden Ham B. Alexander, James Osborne, assistant district attorney, of New York, Congressman Rynn, Congressman Rockwell, General Austin Lathrop of New York, Dr. George W. Graham, Col. A. L. Smith and others.

Congressman Alexander. Captain R. Alexander, representative in Congress from this district, did not accompany Senator Hill, on the return to Washington, but will leave Monday night. He is on his native heath and took advantage of the opportunity for a few days' rest.

In conversation with a NEWS reporter today, Capt. Alexander said that he thought Congress would adjourn about the middle of July. He says that Senator Vance has not been able to appear in the Senate chamber since his return from Gombroom last week. "The Senator," said Capt. Alexander, "is suffering from sciatica, and he did not think that the mountain air agreed with him. Furthermore, he had difficulty in securing medical aid at his rather isolated mountain home, so he decided to return to Washington. As soon as he is able to travel, he will come to Charlotte, thence he will go to the coast. He is not looking well, but he is not so sick now as he was last April. His face is slightly drawn, but that will pass away, it is believed with the return of his health."

The reporter asked Capt. Alexander his opinion of the ticket nominated by the State Democrats. "On the whole," he replied, "I consider it a very good one and think it will be entirely satisfactory to the people of the State." He says that Elias Carr is a man of fine executive abilities. Capt. Alexander says that Mr. Carr's farm is the finest he has seen in the State.

Railroad Change. A circular issued from the office of Capt. Wm. H. Green, General Manager, says: "In compliance with an agreement between the President of this company and the chairman of the board of receivers of the Central Railroad and Banking Company of Georgia, the Macon and Northern Railroad commencing tomorrow, the 20th, will be operated by a Lessee Board representing both companies, and consisting of Messrs. N. E. Harris and J. F. Hanson, of Macon, Ga., and J. H. Rucker and A. H. Hodgson, of Athens, Ga., with Mr. N. E. Harris as President."

Addresses were made by Capt. T. R. Robertson, Col. Anthony Col Martin, Capt. Melton, Lieutenants Weston and others. There were also songs by the Governor's Guard quartette. The evening was most delightfully spent.

Change in Carolina Central Train. On and after Sunday, May 23d, the train which leaves Charlotte for Atlanta at 8 o'clock a. m., and reaches here from Atlanta at 5 p. m., will be discontinued between Charlotte and Monroe. Passengers going to points on the C. C. & N. road can leave Charlotte at 4:30 a. m., and 8:30 p. m., returning at 6:45 a. m. and 11 p. m., making close connection at Monroe both ways. On and after Sunday, May 23d, the train leaving Charlotte at 4:30 a. m. for Portsmouth, Va., will run daily.

"Tolerable" Good Work. If we do say so ourself, THE NEWS has done fairly good work this week, considering the limited facilities of its office. On Wednesday, it got out an 8 page paper of 48 columns.
