Teating Down the Arch.
Charlotte is being dismantled of 23d May decorations to-day and the streamers, flags and festoons are all coming down. The work of tearing down the big arch over Independence Square was begun this morning, and by to-morrow, Charlotte will be strictly business again. It has been mutually agreed that a handsome and imposing arch must be erected as a permanent feature of the square.

At the City Court.
There were but four cases in the mayor's court this morning. Three were for fight, while the fourth was one of a more serious nature, a young man of good family connections being charged with picking pockets. He admitted having robbed a woman of \$2. He was committed to jail in default of \$100 bond. He was a visitor here during the 23d celebration and has a brother in Wadesboro who will be here this afternoon. The young man could give no explanation for his conduct, other than that he was simply a fool.

A Wonderfully Fine Advertisement.
If there is any virtue in advertising, then the recent celebration was big card for Charlotte. Every paper of any consequence in the whole United States has had something to say about it. More than that, all the big dailies from Maine to California, through the instrumentality of the Associated and United Press Associations were furnished full and graphic accounts of the affair, and they printed more or less extended reports. Some of the large dailies published from one to two columns of the proceedings. The big western dailies devoted more space to it than did the New York papers, but for all that the latter gave comprehensive reports. Charlotte was never before so thoroughly well advertised.

Another Good Graded School Exhibit.
The exhibit which lined the walls and filled the tables of the art room of the Winston graded school last week is a matter of pride as to variety and excellence of work. The map drawings, music copying, essays, some on botanical subjects, with specimens attached, the moulding of cubes, squares, and fruit in clay, geometrical figures in cardboard, charcoal sketches and the kindergarten work of the small children were exceedingly well done and deserve, as is intended by Prof. Blair, to be exhibited at the World's Fair in Chicago. At the exercises on Friday night, Mary Lewis Harris, a colored girl, one of the graduating class, received a diploma and also the third prize, a book, for proficiency in reading music at sight.

Election of Commissioners.
The magistrates of the county will have their annual meeting in Charlotte on the first Monday in June, for the election of a board of county commissioners, as required by law. The board elected at that meeting will not be sworn into office until the first Monday in December. This meeting of the magistrates is looked forward to with more interest than usual.

Local Weather Report.
The following is a synopsis of the weather prevailing at 8 a. m. to-day: The low pressure that was central over this section Saturday morning has moved northeasterly, and is in the extreme northeast portion of the country. This low pressure is felt through to the Gulf, and has produced rain over the entire portion of the country lying east of the Mississippi river, the heaviest portion of this rain occurring over this section. A high pressure is in the eastern portion of Texas, which influences the weather to west of the Mississippi river, resulting in clear and cool weather of that portion of the country. Temperatures have very generally fallen over the entire country, but will rise slightly during the day.

Church Services Yesterday.
The disagreeable cold rainy weather yesterday had its effect on the church-going people, as was manifest by the unusually small congregations at all the churches. Those who attended the Tryon Street M. E. church in the morning heard a sermon especially appropriate to the day. It was by Rev. J. B. Rowman, and was on the text, "And God said, this is the token of the covenant which I make between Me and you, and every living creature with you for perpetual generations. I do not my bow in the cloud, and it shall be for a token of a covenant between Me and the earth, and I gave a touching practical sermon on the bow in the cloud, making the following applications to every day life. We may be bowed down by sin and the power of sin, but God has set his bow in the cloud. The seed of the woman shall bruise the serpent's head."

We may suffer temporal losses and our property be swept away in a day or a night, but God has set his bow in the cloud. "For our light affliction which is but for a moment worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory."

We may suffer bereavement, but God has set his bow in the cloud through His son Jesus, the Savior. "I am the resurrection and the life, he that believeth in me though he were dead yet shall he live."

We may be brought to the river of death and be about to cross, but God has set his bow in the cloud. "Yes, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death I will fear no evil for I have art with me."

Notwithstanding the inclement weather there was a better attendance than usual at the Men's Rally at the Young Men's Christian Association in the afternoon to hear Rev. W. S. Bowman's address on "Persevering prayer." As was remarked by one who heard him, Dr. Rowman is a smart man and gave a talk interesting to all and of great comfort to those who exercise the privilege of prayer. As he touchingly referred to the comfort and strength he had received from prayer in his recent severe afflictions, much sympathetic feeling on the faces of his audience was manifested.

The Rally next Sunday will be conducted by three students from Davidson College one of whom is a contestant at Wilmington for the oratorical medal.
Rev. R. C. Reed occupied his pulpit in the morning his text being the 16th verse of the 13 chapter of Genesis. The sermon was highly enjoyed by those present.
Rev. Edward Mack on account of sickness did not preach in the morning at the First Presbyterian church, but at night, delighted his congregation an able and beautiful with sermon.
