### An Elevator Suddenly Obstructed.

For sometime past the hydraulic elevator in the wholesale house of Mr. S. Wittkowsky has been out of gear, and to-day machinists were put to work overhauling it. They found the trouble to be a circular piece of rubber with a wire spring attached that had made its way through the oily mains and the numberless joints and E of the piping leading to the elevator motor, and had only been stopped by a perforated copper screen. The obstruction was a substance that had been loosened at some point along the mains, and which was larger than the pipe through which it passed. It was forced through by the pressure of the water. The elevator now works all right.

### The Harriet at a Farm

Joe Vita, the harpist of the Italian band and a fruit seller, in Charlotte, sometime ago bought a suburban farm, and for several years he has been harpist, merchant and farmer. ### A Profit to the Count

Investigation shows that the Mecklenburg Criminal court, instead of being an expense to the county, is a source of profit. The treasurer of Mecklenburg has paid out an account of the Criminal court for the year 1890, \$1,823.34, and for the year 1891, \$2,155.46, a total for the two years of \$3,978.80. As an offset to this is \$1,097.88, amount received by fines, jury tax and convict labor for 1890, and \$273.34, amount received by fines, jury tax and convict labor for 1891, a total for the two years of \$1,371.22. This shows amount of profit to the county, after paying court expenses, for 1890 and 1891, \$2,607.58, or a profit of \$1,625.36 for each year. The cost of working the convicts is 33 cents per day. The value of the convict labor to the county is estimated at 41 cents per day.
