MINNEAPOLIS.

TODAY'S NEWS FROM THE CENTER.
FANNETT TEMPORARY Chairman - Blaine Evidently Has the Best of It.

MINNEAPOLIS, JUNE 7.—Early this morning, Quay estimated Blaine's vote at 575, without Michigan. He claims that Tennessee and Illinois have changed to Blaine. The New York Mail and Express at 1 o'clock today, says Harrison has 511, and claims Georgia solidly for Harrison.

At the opening of convention, Platt was unanimously elected temporary chairman. Platt claims that Blaine will be nominated on first ballot. It is said that the Harrison men will break for McKinley after first ballot.

Hasset made a rousing speech, in which he waved the bloody shirt and denounced the South for negro outrages. Tom Reed was then called on and spoke. His speech was cheered to the echo.

After Reed's speech cries for McKinley were heard all over the vast assembly, but he did not make his appearance. It was thought at one time that the friends of President Harrison would antagonize the election of Hasset but they did not. A temporary organization was perfected then Mr. Sewell of New Jersey, offered a resolution that the roll be called and that the chairman of each delegation announce the members of the committee selected. At 1:45 the convention adjourned until 11:30 tomorrow.

The Young Ladies Seminary.

The commencement exercises at the Y. M. C. A. hall, tonight of the Seminary for Young Ladies, will be the event in town. The programme was given in yesterday's News, and it is short well designed and appropriate, and the people are in love with it. There will be a great crowd in attendance, and a decidedly pleasant evening is in store. Dr. W. S. Currie's address will be quite a feature.

At the Seminary this afternoon, crowds of visitors thronged the art gallery. It is really one of the finest art displays ever made in Charlotte and there has been some very fine ones in past years. Our people are thoroughly alive to the fact that in this Seminary, Charlotte has a capital and a most worthy institution and one that will be handsomely sustained. It could not be otherwise with an institution of its merits.

Local Weather Report.

The following is a synopsis of the weather prevailing at 8 a.m. today: The center of the high pressure which is influencing the weather conditions of the country is located this morning at Buffalo, N. Y., but extends over the whole country to the east of the Mississippi river. Over the whole of that section generally fair weather is in progress, the only exception to this being light showers which have occurred around this intermediate section, and around the Florida coast. To the west of the Mississippi river the conditions are predominated over by a low pressure which is central at St. Paul. Light rains have occurred around the center of the low, to the east of it, and as far south as Texas. Generally fair weather will continue over this section.

Arrangements for the Transportation of the North Carolina delegations. The Palmer House to be Headquarters for the Progressives.

The North Carolina delegation will meet in Washington Saturday, June 13th, and leave there the same afternoon for the Pennsylvania railroad arriving in Chicago on Sunday afternoon the 14th instant. Headquarters have been secured at the Palmer House and the delegates and alternates will be quartered there and at the Clifford House, opposite side of the street. It is expected that North Carolina will be fully represented and the delegation a large number of members accompany the delegation. Charlotte alone will have a delegation of 8 or 10.

A circular letter from Mr. F. E. Rushee and Mr. E. Chambers Smith to the delegates and alternates says: At the request of quite a number of delegates and alternates, we have been collecting such information and making such arrangements as we have thought necessary for transportation and accommodation of the delegates and alternates of Oregon. After such correspondence, we have come to the conclusion that the safest course as regards transportation will be to buy return tickets at the local stations where the journeys begin. Most of the delegates will be in arrangement for sleepers to be made via Pennsylvania railroad. A sleeper will leave Greenfield on the night of June 17th, reaching Washington Saturday morning June 18th, at 12:30 p.m. We shall expect the delegates and such members of the delegation as reach Washington in time to leave for Chicago by the C. O. & P. express on the Pennsylvania railroad at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday, June 18th, reaching Chicago at 3:30 p.m. Sunday, June 19th. Headquarters have been obtained at the Palmer House and rooms and board either at the Palmer House or at the Clifford House just opposite. A meeting of the delegates will be held at the Metropolitan Hotel in Washington on June 13th, at 12:30 p.m. One or more special sleepers, as may be necessary, will be provided for the use of the delegates and alternates between Washington and Chicago.

At Our Time He Lived in Charlotte.

THE NEWS yesterday copied from the New York Sun an account of the marriage of a negro preacher named Rev. J. D. Boice, to a white woman, at Princeton, N. J. The account said that Boice was a graduate of a North Carolina college. It comes closer home than that, it now transpires. The colored reverend who married a white woman from Massachusetts, was formerly pastor of a colored church in Charlotte. He is well remembered by the colored people of this city.
