THE COTTON MARKETS.

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 30.—I have been a close observer of cotton conditions for some years. My last three estimates of the crop are as follows: Made in November 1899 ... 9,474,000 Made in November 1900 ... 10,400,000 Made in November 1901 ... 10,760,000

New Orleans, Aug. 30.—The American Cotton Exchange will be closed until Tuesday. The long closure is welcome for more reason than one. In the first place, speculative activity is terribly trying in such weather as the south has had to endure for some weeks.

The crop has made no headway in August as it seemed to have matured in July and stopped work. If this condition goes on in September, as it is likely to do, we cannot hope for any more cotton than the present going out crop as we are not any better off than this time last year.

The explanation of this unexpected large total is found in the allowance of 1,974,000 for southern consumption. Mr. Hester will publish his figures on Monday next. If his report confirm the statement just noted, Mr. Buxton's forecast of 10,750,000 minimum will receive historic seal.

You would be surprised to see the difference in the crop now if you have not seen it since first of July. Of course there are plenty of bright spots, but if you will inquire, you will find care in selecting seed will be one of the causes of this. There are plenty of disappointing spots—rust and shedding getting in their work.

After all, crop guessing is no department of Astronomy and each investigator should be content to give his information for what it is worth. In such a case pride of opinion is simply preposterous. As a rule the composite photograph of a crop affords the best likeness.
