Italy is a land of music and its greatest band is Sorrentino's Banda Rossa, or Red Band, which is to play at the Academy of Music next Tuesday night. It has forty-five members, most of whom have been with Sorrentino twelve and fourteen years. Some of them were classmates of his in the conservatory at Naples. The band has a most remarkable scrap book and were the clippings not there, one might well refuse to believe that it has received the astonishing amount of critical press commendation claimed for it. When the band played in Boston, Philip Hale of the Journal, one of the most extreme critics in America, wrote and he knew of no other band the equal of the Banda Rossa. Ben Woolf and W. F. Anthon wrote in similar vein over their own signatures. In New York City, the Tribune, the Times, the Sun, in fact all the leading papers, joined Boston in saying pleasant things about the band. In Philadelphia, Providence, Albany, Rochester, Buffalo, Detroit, Minneapolis, where the band plays six to eight weeks every year; in Kansas City, where the band has played seven weeks in the last two years; in St. Louis, where peace was asked for the ashes of the late Patrick Gilmore, the band was sensationally successful.

Audiences find something new in the playing of these men. Their climaxes rise almost beyond belief and they phrase with the art of prima donnas.

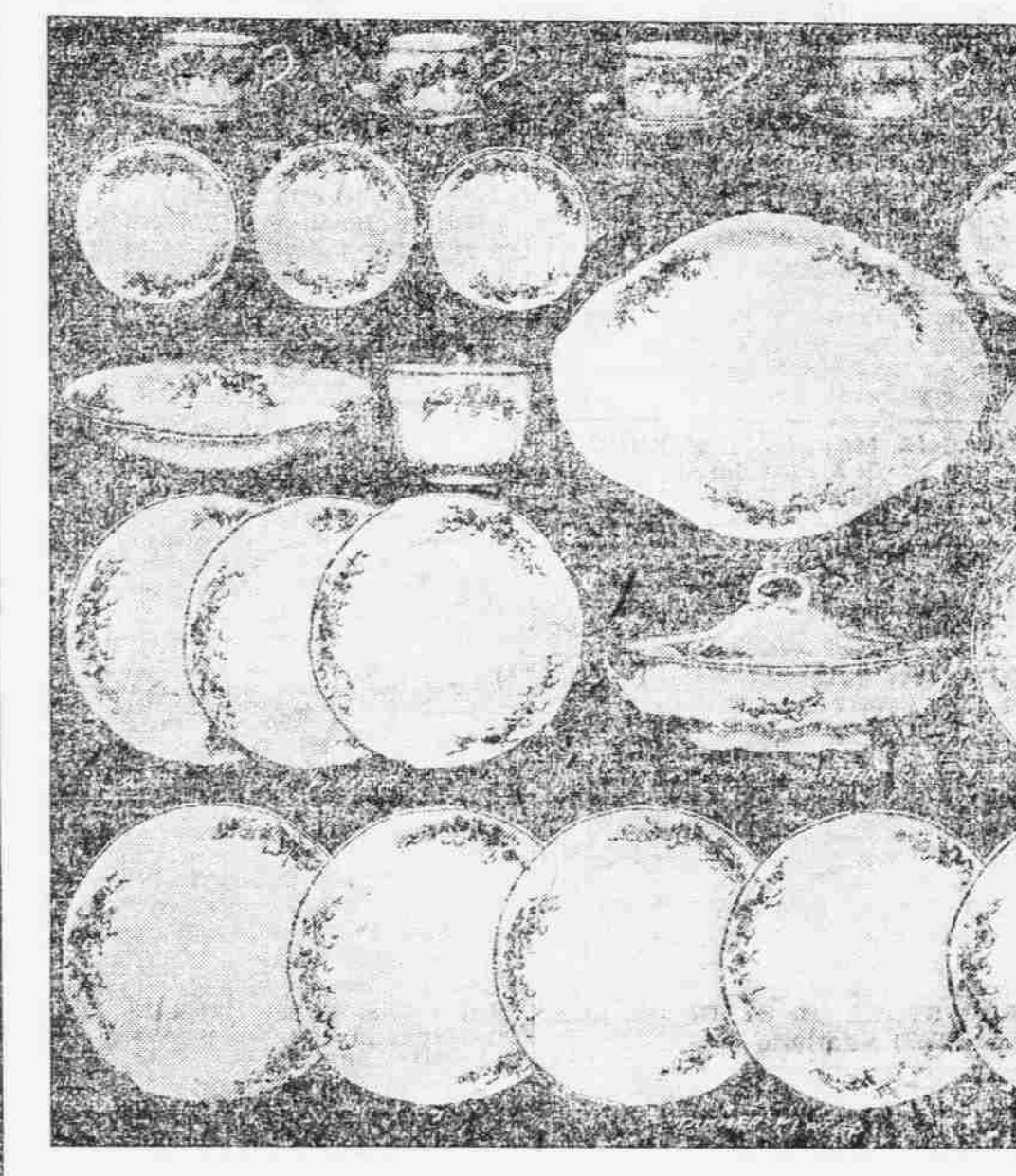

DECORATION. This decoration is new and original in design, having been selected from hundreds of sketches made especially for this purpose by the best artists in this country. This decoration is put on by a process called transfer work, which leaves the impression of the flower on the ware, and it is then colored by experienced artists. While it is not strictly hand painted, the coloring is done by hand. After putting on the coloring matter it is placed in the kiln and burned into the ware. If used for many years the coloring will always remain as bright and fresh as new. The gold tracings give a richness of effect, which adds materially to the beauty of the ware and is an expensive process.
