Market Reports

New York, July 9.—C. W. Lee & Co. says: The market today was decidedly firmer. That is to say, yesterday's reaction continued but with a steadier undertone and less irregularity in the course of prices. As was natural on the first day of recovery prices moved around rather uncertainly and sentiment lacked confidence during the greater part of yesterday's session. Today, however, there were more buyers in the market in all options and the outlook seemed clearer. After a slight setback following the opening commission houses for the purchase of December and January began to come in and the market improved. Reports from Liverpool showed better spinning demand over there and there was a noticeable increase in the investment buying in such options as October, December and January here. It is now known that the supply of cotton at the close of the year will be at about record figures as regards smallness and this will result in an exceedingly active demand for the first of the new crop. This would be natural under any conditions and now that the new Orleans pool seems bent on closing as many mills as possible by charging an exorbitant price for the cotton owned by it there will be a very liberal demand for cotton during the early fall months. We have received trustworthy advice that fully 75 percent of New England mills will shut down for three or four weeks during August. Weather conditions were again satisfactory today although reports of insect damage continue to be received from Texas. We cannot but feel that the purchase of December and January around 9 1/2 to be advised and the very first unfavorable weather developments will result in a sharp advance in those positions. It will be remembered that cotton sold in the fields of Texas at ten cents a pound all through August, September and October in 1900 and the situation this year favors even higher prices than prevailed at that time.
