

### A Few Minutes With The Recorder

"I feel like I had been guilty" exclaimed W. M. Swaringer this morning when Chief Irwin called his name and informed him of a charge of drunkenness which rested against him. Swaringer was very penitent. He was from Gastonia he said, had never been arrested before in his life and has a wife and child at home. He had three dollars when he lit in Charlotte, he declared, but it had taken wings and flown while he was drunk. He begged piteously that he be allowed to depart, declaring that he would walk to Gastonia so fast he'd make that way station in three hours. The Recorder moved by his appeals, dismissed him.

There were two charges against Charles McKee. Officer Ayers arrested him yesterday afternoon for using profanity on the street and after he had been released on bond, Officer Hunter found him toting a pair of knucks. On the first charge he was fined \$5 and costs and on the last committed for court in default of \$25 bond.

Alenzo Sample was fined \$5 and costs for keeping an unlicensed dog on his premises. On consideration of his paying the tax and the costs of the case, the Recorder dismissed his case.

Cette Harris and Broom McDonald had a scrap yesterday afternoon and were caught with the goods by Officer Henderson. It was such a trivial matter and the culprits so diminutive, that the Recorder dismissed them with a warning.

### RAILROAD NOTES

It is denied by members of the firm of John L. Williams & Sons, Richmond, large owners of Seaboard Air Line railway stocks and partners of Mr. John Skelton Williams, president of the Seaboard system, that Mr. Williams is to retire from that position and be succeeded by Mr. R. F. York, of New York, as rumored in telegrams from New York Monday night. This denial, it is stated, is confirmed by direct information from Mr. John Skelton Williams, who is in New York, and from whom a telegram has been received. Mr. Williams is quoted as saying that the idea of a change in the presidency of the Seaboard is not in contemplation, but that there may be some changes in minor offices.

At the time of the recently announced alliance of the Seaboard with the Rock Island and Frisco interests, it was announced authoritatively that Mr. Williams would remain at the head of the Seaboard. It is understood that Mr. Williams and others succeeded in securing temporary control of the Seaboard stocks, with the purpose of consummating the negotiations with the Rock Island system, but every assurance is given that Mr. Williams will not retire from the Seaboard presidency.

General Manager Kruttschnitt of the Southern Pacific has been summoned to New York for a conference with President Harriman. It is supposed that among the subjects to be taken up are the company's effort to obtain certain terminal franchises in San Francisco, the proposed Sierra tunnel, reconstruction work in Nevada and Utah, the Salt Lake cutoff and questions relating to other improvements.

Members of the Memphis Cotton Exchange have succeeded in inducing the railroads to permit them to route all their shipments, instead of 50 per cent, as in former seasons, over any line that they are the consignees see fit to designate.

On the Big Four this week a heavy special train made the run from Cleveland to Columbus, 138 miles, in two hours and 50 minutes, beating the time of the 20th Century Limited 10 minutes for the distance traveled. It ran to Chillicothe in four hours and 45 minutes.

The Crystal River line to be taken over by the Denver & Rio Grande enters some of the most valuable coal fields of the Colorado Fuel & Iron Co. and it is thought that an extension will be made.

### COTTON IS TOO HIGH.

So Says Mr. D. A. Tompkins Of Charlotte.

In an interview in the New York Commercial, Mr. D. A. Tompkins, of this city, says:

"The cotton mill men of the South naturally see little that is favorable to them in the existing situation. Cotton is too high for it to be manufactured very profitably. I do not expect the Southern mills to close down, however, even if cotton stays over 10 cents. The mills have all started up now, and they will continue in operation, but if cotton does not come down in price there is going to be very little margin in the business for the mill men until the goods market has readjusted itself and got established on a plane of higher prices."

"It is too early to say what kind of a season this is going to be in the cotton goods trade. The season is just opening, and there are many things which may influence the market. We hope that the advance in the price of silver will help things, and that the Oriental business this year will be greater than ever before, but it is too early yet for any one to attempt to say whether it will or not. It looks like a season of good business, but small profits for the spinners."

Mrs. Sherrill, of Mt. Ulla, who has been completely prostrated since the killing of her son, Russell, is reported to be slightly improved, says the Winston Sentinel.

It is learned that the son left his mother a life insurance policy for \$3,000. A responsible gentleman tells the Sentinel that the family will be advised to spend every dollar of the \$3,000, if necessary, in the prosecution of the White brothers who killed Sherrill. Sentiment in and around Mt. Ulla is said to be decidedly against the brothers.

### COMING ATTRACTIONS

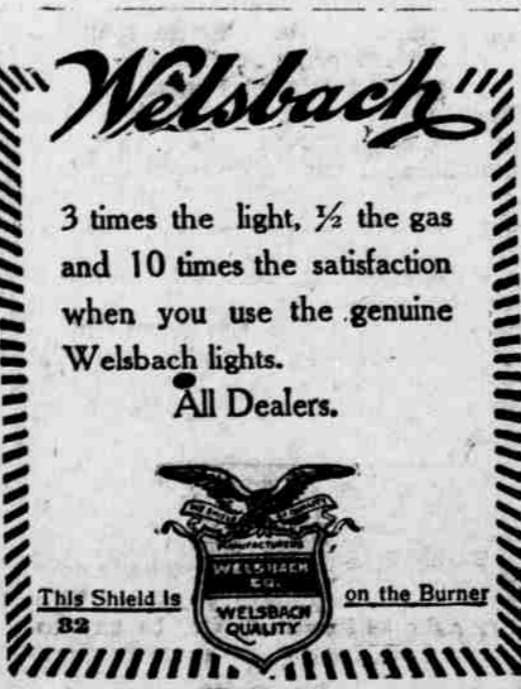
