There is no buying power behind the situation. This was evident several days ago, and it grows more evident every day. As we said vesterday news from the south would make one bullish under ordinary circumstances. But withoutside influence as they are today it makes one very cautious. Prices are rather high when you go back a few years. Very high when you look at the price of stocks. Some of the best stocks are selling declined 1.00. at a five, six and some at a seven per cent, basis. And yet the feeling in Atenison the financial community is very blue We fail to see in the outlook that which is necessary to make one a bull on cotton or anything else. Everything outside is against the market Cotton is coming in larger blocks. If the crop is only eleven million bales there will be a rush for a while. This will make a weak market or tend to ease the situation. As far as the outlook goes there is very little inducement to buy except on a good break and then take quick profits. On a bulge we would be inclined to sell. The trade has been hurt by the cotton corner, Badly hurt, All this will make itself felt in time. Cotton has been bulled for 3 years. We would be very cautious about buying very much just at the moment.
