Washington, March 15 .- The Midshipmen at Annapolis have been conspiring to prevent the high standard of scholarship, according to the statethe House Committee on Naval Affairs today.

Brilliancy has been discouraged and a sort of trade union agreement to hold midshipmen on a dead level so far as class records are concerned has been in existence, so the Secretary of the Navy told the committee.

There has been a tendency to place a man who barely passes on the plane with those having higher records and been discouraged.

The operation is scheduled to occur next Tuesday afternoon at the city hospital, when a large number of surgeons and physicians of this city will be present to witness the unusual feat. be able to walk on the injured leg until six or eight weeks after the skin has

Immediately after the accident the Enterprise Mill authorities had the boy conveyed to the city hospital and have seen that he received the best of attention. The cost of the operation on Tuesday will be borne by them.
