At Asheville April 24 .- An Interesting Legal Opinion. Special to The News.


Asheville, April 18.-Albert T. Summey died about two o'clock Monday morning after a lingering illness, in which for weeks he has been hanging between life and death. All his family with the exception of his son, Dr. George Summey, editor of the Southwestern Presbyterian of New Orleans were at his bedside when the end came.
