IMPUDENT NEGROES. Are Made to Stand by their Contracts With Mr. Alexander.

Mr. John O. Alexander, one of the best known farmers of the county is having some trouble with his wage hands. Yesterday morning four of his negro hands came to him for some money, asking that he pay them \$10 for their services in advance.

He told them that he did not have the money on hand but would pay them Saturday when he went to town. The negroes were not satisfied with this and openly demanded the money.

"Haul your cotton to town now and sell it. We want our money," said one of the negroes.

Mr. Alexander telephoned 'Squire

Hilton to issue warrants for John Price and Frank Barnett both of whom talked very impudent to him. They refused to work and said they would quit their contract unless the money was paid to them.

Shortly after 12 o'clock yesterday Constable S. C. Ross left for Mr. Alexander's place, armed with the two warrants, and returned about 4 o'clock in the afternoon with the two negroes in custody.

They were given a hearing before 'Squire Hilton and the court ordered that they pay a fine of \$50 or carry out their contracts which is in effect until the first of August.

All four of the negroes reported for work this morning.
