Times Democrat Summary Cotton

New Orleans, June 30.—The formation of a pool on Thursday with enough long interest in July held in strong hands—some thirty or forty thousand bales to squeeze New Orleans shorts out of a penny in the event the shorts out as expected has complicated the mid-summer position considerably, and yesterday the local ring scared up sufficient covering in that option to boost it \$1 a bale. Meanwhile the new crop through subtle influence of sentiment gained price ground in the face of a bearish crop outlook. The spot market evidenced improvement most of which was traceable to the strength of July contracts, and the promise of a squeeze. At the moment the situation appears to involve some relatively consequential possibilities though nothing really important is likely to occur because of the pigmy proportion of the speculative interest in all positions, and a bureau condition showing anything less than radical in the general professional view will hardly stir up a whirlwind because the public persistently refused to take a hand. The week end figures were about a standstill though bullish to the extent of showing a greater decrease in visible supply than for the same week in any previous year.

New York Cotton Summary

New York, June 30.—The July notices, amounting to 60,000 bales, had less effect than was expected. It was not the first time that the bears have mapped out a certain programme for a day, only to find that they had got the cart before the horse. At any rate, although prices declined moderately, early in the day, they soon turned the other way, and advanced sharply under the influence of buying by the large spot houses, and others. A good many thought this indicated a firm under-tone. At least, it indicated that cotton is no such drug in the market as the pessimists had supposed. The weather was favorable, the Liverpool advices were not by any means inspiring and the speculations were small. But in spite of it all there was buying of a good character, and now that the July notices are out of the way it would not be at all surprising to see a healthier market, at least for a time. The short interest is still very large in the next crop, and some private Liverpool advices state that the under-tone there is firm. Some have "reopened" pending the Government report which is to appear on July 3rd.

So many different versions and explanations of the term lynch law have at various times been given and occasionally are even yet added to, that it seems fitting to recount the tragic incident which has since given a name to so many calamitous occurrences not only in our land, but on occasions also in that of others. New York Sun Summary Stocks. (Furnished by Gibert & Clay of New Orleans, La.)

New York, June 30.—Prices of stocks at the opening were generally quite a bit lower than they closed Thursday, reflecting perhaps, the influence of the lower range of quotations sent over from London. After a little while prices rallied and fluctuated without any great change until the early part of the afternoon. In the last two hours of the afternoon stocks again developed pronounced weakness, and fell rapidly, with only a small recovery just before the close. On the decline many of the principal stocks, such as U. S. Steel, common and preferred, Pennsylvania Railroad, Northern Pacific Railroad, Union Pacific Railroad and Reading touched lower figures than they have at any time since the culmination of the upward movement in prices that ensued after the period of demoralization in the market in the first days of May, and the U. S. Steel stocks made a new low record for the year. Especially pressure converged upon the Northern Pacific Railroad Great Northern preferred, and so-called Hill group of securities.

Measure off one and a half ounces and add an equal amount of alcohol; let this cucumber essence stand over night; in the morning add the powdered soap; boil very slowly of cucumber juice; boil very slowly and then add the benzoin.
