## THIS MONTH ON PINEHURST GOLF LINKS

Pinehurst, N. C., March 11.—This month will round out a record-breaking season of golf tournament fixtures, four important contests being scheduled for the remaining weeks.

First of all is the annual club championship, which takes place today and concludes Saturday. Next week, commencing Wednesday, comes the fourth annual "spring tournament," the week after, March 25, 26, 27 and 28, the annual championship tournament for women, which precedes the eleventh annual "United North and South amateur championship," which fills in the week from March 29 to April 4, inclusive.

The annual club championship will be open only to regular or season members, with thirty-six holes in qualification and final, one division of sixteen qualifying, with a gold medal for the best score, the club tournament cup for the winner of the match play rounds, and cups for the runner-up and the consolation division winners.

Six divisions of sixteen each will qualify in the annual spring tournament for the president's governor's secretary's treasurer's captain's and club cup, with a special cup for the best division runner-up and consolation division winners and a gold medal for the best qualification score.

One division will qualify in the women's championship, with a gold medal for the best score, the championship cup for the winner of the match play round, and a cup for the runner-up.

Six divisions of sixteen each will qualify in the annual United North and South championship for the president's governor's secretary's treasurer's captain's and club cups, with sterling cups to the division runners-up and consolation division winners, and a gold medal for the best qualification score. An open thirty-six hole medal play championship event with \$100, and the championship gold medal, \$50 and \$25 in prizes, will close the week, amateurs winning to receive plate.

## WILLIE HOPPE FAVORITE IN BILLIARD MATCH

Chicago, Ill., March 11.—Lovers of billiards are on edge in anticipation of the rare treat in store for them in Orchestra Hall tonight, when Jacob Schaefer, the "wizard," will defend the 18.1 championship title against Willie Hoppe, "the boy billiard wonder." Will the veteran meet defeat at the hands of the youngster, or has he a ghost of a show of winning? Such to relate, it is the opinion of many enthusiasts that the ghost will not be walking in this case, and that Schaefer, who was an expert at the game before Hoppe was born, is nevertheless doomed to taste defeat at the hands of his young rival.

Should Schaefer meet defeat, the boy's victory will be framed with all the ornaments of an ironmonger's shop. But a comparatively short time ago the veterans were disposed to laugh at Hoppe's claim for recognition, and they are credited with telling him to go and get a reputation. The youthful player went, and returned with the 18.2 championship title, which he had wrested from the veteran French expert, Mamiee Vignoux. This title he forfeited later to George Sutton. Next week, in New York, Hoppe will play Sutton for the title which he forfeited. If he wins the match with Schaefer tonight and the coming match with Sutton, Hoppe will be the acknowledged champion of the world at the "gentleman's game."

## Stock Show Held in New \$350,000 Coliseum

Fort Worth, Texas, March 11.—The meeting and exhibition of the National Cattle and Breeders' Association, for which preparations have been making for nearly a year, was formally opened in this city today and will continue for one week. The occasion has attracted several thousand breeders and others interested in the live stock industry from all over Texas and from points in Oklahoma, Missouri, Kansas and other States.

The exhibition itself is the most notable event of its kind ever held in the southwest. The show is held in the new \$350,000 Coliseum, which is admirably adapted for the purpose. The commodious building is filled with prize-winning horses and blooded stock from many parts of the country. The opening exercises this morning were participated in by Governor Campbell and other notables. Immediately after the exercises were concluded the work of judging the exhibits began and will continue until the show closes next Tuesday.
