There is one vacancy on the board of aldermen, that caused by the resignation of Alderman McDowell. Mr. J. O. Walker has resigned from the public safety board, and Mr. R. H. Jordan's death several weeks ago, caused a vacancy on the water board.

There are no names being put forward for these positions as yet except that Mr. B. S. Davis, proprietor of the Dilworth Drug Store Company is mentioned as being a good man to take Mr. Walker's place on the safety board.

It was thought at one time that there would be another vacancy on the aldermanic board on account of the proposed removal from the First Ward of Mr. J. W. Wadsworth. Mr. Wadsworth, however, will not move out of the First Ward.

The North Carolina Medical Journal and the Charlotte Medical Journal have been merged into one publication, which makes one of the finest journals of its kind in the south. The style of the combined journal will be The Charlotte Medical Journal. The company which will publish it has an authorized capital of \$125,000, with \$12,000 paid in.

The incorporators are Drs. E. C. Register, W. O. Nesbit, P. M. King, R. L. Gibson and W. H. Wakefield. Dr. Nesbit is president of the company and Dr. Register will be editor of the publication.

Low pressure prevails this morning over the northern part of the country from Montana to New England. An area of high pressure is centered over the Gulf states, and another high pressure area over the north Pacific states. Rain has fallen over the middle and south Atlantic and Gulf states, and over the Ohio and middle Mississippi valleys. Elsewhere the weather has been generally fair during the past 24 hours. Temperatures have changed but little during the past 24 hours, and are this morning about normal. Indications are for partly cloudy weather in the vicinity of Charlotte tonight and Friday. W. J. WHERE DO OUR CAR FARES GO?

Two Out of Every Five are Used to Support Capitalized Earning-power.

It is perfect nonsense to say that the public has no concern in these traction matters; it has every concern in them. For the sake of the \$40,000,000 that Mr. Yerkes extracted from the street railroads of Chicago, the community endured for many years the most abominable traction service in this world. The \$40,000,000 would have given the people good service; the difference between the good service and the bad service inflicted upon them meant a sum of inconvenience, discomfort, suffering, and sometimes of impaired health that is not pleasant to contemplate. In New York the money represented by water in the street railroad system would have provided the city with ample, quick, and comfortable transit in all directions. The issuing of that water means the difference between such transit and the terrible scenes witnessed nightly at the Brooklyn Bridge and in the subway.

Not only that, but it makes the difference between a normal and an abnormal fare. If there never had been any water in the New York street railroad system, if the total capital represented nothing but the actual investment, if there never had been any experiments with this devilish "capitalizing of the earning power," the street railroads of New York could carry passengers for three cents and make money. So that of every five cents paid now on these railroads two cents are paid to support the water and three cents in compensation for the service rendered.—Charles Edward Russell, in the March Everybody's.

Going the Pace in New York Society.

Upton Sinclair's novel of New York Society, now running in The American Magazine, is an extraordinary revelation of the extravagance of the super-rich. Here, for example, is a jar for the ordinary reader:

"Just think of the number of people there are trying to go the pace! They say there are seven thousand millionaires in this country, but I say there are twenty thousand in New York alone—or if they don't own a million they're spending the income of it, which amounts to the same thing. You can figure that a man who pays ten thousand a year for rent is paying fifty thousand to live; and there's Fifth Avenue—two miles of it, if you count the up-town and down-town parts; and there's Madison Avenue, and half a dozen houses adjoining on every side street; and then there are the hotels and apartment houses, to say nothing of the West Side and Riverside Drive. And you meet the mobs of people in the shops and the hotels and the theatres, and they all want to be better dressed than you. I saw a woman here today that I never saw in my life before, and heard her say 'she'd paid two thousand dollars for a lace handkerchief; and it might have been true, for I've been asked to pay ten thousand for a lace shawl at a bargain. It's a common enough thing to see a woman walking on Fifth Avenue with twenty thousand dollars' worth of furs on her. I know women who have a dozen sets of furs—ermine, chinchilla, black fox, baby lamb, and mink and sable; and I know a man whose chauffeur quit him because he wouldn't buy him a fancy fur coat! And once people used to muck their furs away, and take care of them; but now they wear them about, and you can fairly see them fade. Or else their cut goes out of fashion, and so they have to have new ones!"
