POWER BOATS TO HAVE RACE NEXT WEEK

Palm Beach, Fla., March 12.—Power craft of many descriptions are putting in an appearance here in readiness for the fourth annual motor boat races and carnival to be given next week under the auspices of the Palm Beach Power Boat Association.

CABLE CHESS MATCH BEGINS

New York, March 12.—The usual lively interest was manifested by chess players today in the opening of the international match by cables, America vs. Great Britain, for the St. George News trophy. The American end of the match is conducted by the Brooklyn Chess Club, while nearly 3,500 miles distant the British end of the contest is in charge of the City of London Chess Club. The match is conducted on eight boards and the quarters of the two chess organizations are connected by cable and telegraph. If the match is unfinished tonight, the play will be resumed tomorrow morning and continued until 6:30 p. m., when any uncompleted games will be adjudicated by the judges agreed upon for the purpose.

The international cable chess matches for the News trophy began in 1896 and with the exception of one break have been held annually since that time. The original prize was a challenge cup valued at \$500, presented by Sir George Newnes, president of the Chess Club of Great Britain. The Brooklyn Chess Club captured the trophy by winning three years straight. The trophy remained in possession of the Brooklyn club for eight years until it was recovered by the City of London Chess Club when the contests were revived last year. The only condition attaches to the contests is that the players are representatives of the country they represent.

Pitchers Will No Longer Rub Ball on Dir

Patrons' patience no longer be tried by the pitcher leisurely leaving his position to slowly rub ever new ball that is put in play in the soil until it loses its color of glossiness. No player will be allowed to disorder a ball by rubbing it with the soil, and therefore the annoying delays that have attended the putting of new balls into play have been done away with. The chairman of the Joint Rules committee, whose firm manufacturers the brands used in major league games, assures his associates, so it is stated, that the balls supplied this season will be so finished that the covers will not be as slippery as in former years. If it appears in the early games that the pitchers' control of new balls is not sufficient under the restriction imposed by the amendment to Sec. 4 of Rule 14, the discoloration of balls should be permitted prior to the opening of the game under the immediate supervision of the umpire. Danger to the batsman and deterioration in the effectiveness of a pitcher from lack of control must be underrated by the rule-makers.

WILL SWATHMORE ACCEPT GIFT?

Swarthmore, Pa., March 12.—Swarthmore College, which has been left a portion of the estate of the late Miss Anna T. James on condition that the institution abandon athletics, will either accept the gift with the condition named or refuse it, according to a statement made by President Swayne. The college has received many communications showing how the gift could be accepted without carrying out Miss James' conditions, and in reply to these President Swayne gave out the following statement: The question will be taken up by the board of trustees.

"The numerous suggestions by which Swarthmore College might receive the conditional gift of Anna T. James without carrying out her wishes in regard to intercollegiate athletics have not been considered at all by the board. It has been and is the unwavering purpose of the board to meet the matter squarely and either decline the gift or accept it with the conditions.

"The question of abandoning co-education at Swarthmore has never been considered by the faculty or the board. The college has been co-educational from the beginning. The charter provides for instruction of both sexes. In the last five years there has been an increase of 60 per cent in boys and nearly 60 per cent in girls.
