THE BLAINS NOT IN CHINESE RIOT

Report That It Occurred in Kashing a Mistake, Donshang Being the Place—Cause of the Dissatisfaction Among the Chinese.

Friends and relatives here of Rev. and Mrs. J. Mercer Blain, missionaries of the Southern Presbyterian church at Kashing, China, are relieved to find that they were not in a recent riot, which at first was reported to have occurred at Dongshang, but which really occurred at Dongshang. Mrs. Blain was Miss Claud Grier, sister of Mrs. C. N. G. Butt, Mr. Blain writes on February 17th, of this matter:

"We were not a little surprised when the last mail brought us letters from friends at home expressing sympathy with us at the supposed loss of our school property and manifesting anxiety as to our safety. News will have reached you some time since that the riot was at Dongshang and not at Kashing. The telegraphic report was correct and the mistake a natural one."

"Fu" means a prefecture and consists of several magisterial districts. The fu city, as Kashing, is the city where the prefect, the highest official in a fu resides. The riot occurred at Dongshang, which is a magisterial city in the Kashing prefecture, 21 miles from here. The members of our mission there will have written you fully of what occurred. The building burned was a native one, part of which was used for the industrial school. The chapel was saved but will need to be repaired. The dwellings were not disturbed and the missionaries suffered no injury.

"There have been serious troubles in this prefecture and throughout this entire section of country in both Chekiang and Kiang provinces for more than two months. Poor crops and heavy taxes (now reduced by the government) have been in large measure responsible for the existing state of affairs. Highway robbers and pirates have taken advantage of the unsettled state of the country to make depredations in every direction, attacking individuals, private residences, shops, boats, villages and some large market towns. They even went so far as to make an attack on the steam launch lines which run between Shanghai, Soochow, Kashing and Manchow. Plunder is the object, and none have been injured who would allow themselves to be robbed without resistance. One launch was fired on and four men killed and others wounded because they refused to stop and submit to robbery. There has been one fight, 30 miles from here, between soldiers and robbers. The battle lasted several hours; a number of soldiers were wounded and brought to our hospital here. What losses the robbers suffered we have no means of knowing. The government has sent hundreds of foreign-drilled soldiers and has gun boats patrolling the waterways. We hope that the leaders of the gang will soon be captured and beheaded and that many of the bandits will be dismissed and their comrades said to be more or less sympathetic with them, which makes it difficult to accomplish anything. There is no uprising and no meanness is felt about this city. Hithering has to be done in the day time only, as I know of at least three missionaries who have met with robbers at night."

"Though we have suffered no loss, we appreciate very much the interest expressed in us and know that the same sympathy is intended for the special appeal for our school fund will be read by many in the February issue of the Missionary."

"In case of loss of life the executive committee of foreign missions will be notified by wire, so our friends need not be unduly alarmed by press dispatches."

THE BOARD MUST NOT BE LIABLE

Water Commissioners do Not Want the Responsibility of Draining the Reservoir on East Seventh Street.

The board of water commissioners at a meeting last night, after discussing the proposed drainage of the upper reservoir on East Seventh street, and the board voted by its decision made at the last meeting not to allow the pond to be drained unless all the citizens in that section consented, and the board relieved of any responsibility of the consequences to the health of the community.

At the meeting on March the 14th, there was a petition presented signed by a majority of the citizens in this section, though not all asking that the board order the draining of this pond, but there was a provision in the petition, which seemed to contemplate that the city would be liable for any resulting sickness. At this meeting, this petition was not adopted, but the following order was made:

"It was ordered by the board of water commissioners that the superintendent be instructed to proceed without delay to drain the water off from the upper reservoir at the old water works pumping station and East Seventh street, provided, that all the residents in the neighborhood east of the said pumping station and between the Lawyers road on the north and the Providence road on the south, sign a petition in writing to the board, requesting and consenting that the said pond may be drained at this time, provided, further, that this action is taken with the distinct understanding that if at any time in the future the board shall deem it advisable and necessary to refill said reservoir with water, it reserves the right to do so without consent."

It will be seen from this order that the board is not unwilling to drain the reservoir if the people want it, but it is thought unwise to do this at this time, as it might cause sickness, and unless there is unanimous consent to the above order it will not be done.

As there are now many matters to be passed upon by the board as the work on the streets progresses, it was decided to hold a meeting week, so that these matters could be attended to quickly. The members expressed themselves as very much pleased with the progress of the work so far.

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To-day's Markets

J. S. Bache & Co's Cotton Letter.
New York, March 27.—The cotton market opened easy at a decline of 8 to 10 points in harmony with the disappointing Liverpool cables. The same crowd that sold the market down at last night's close continued their operations in Liverpool and renewed their aggressive tactics in the local market this morning.

Apparently the staple has no friends and responds easily to the slightest pressure and the buying orders from the south which used to stem the downward tide are shut off by adverse legislation.

The market was a lifeless affair with prices fluctuating within a narrow range. We feel that cotton should be bought at all weak spots.

Morehead & Co's Cotton Letter.
New York, March 27.—There was no snap in the market today yet the bears did not offer much pressure after the first hour. Cables were encouraging to the bears. Manchester advices being very poor and spot business small continued favorable also stood them in hand.

But fear of spot situation and of a rise in the weather caused some caution after prices had worked off about 10 points above the opening and there was a little covering through the big short secured confident ultimately of lower prices.

Trading was light, receipts at primary points were indicative of freer movement but advices say that only the lower grades are being supported. The better grades being held back. Spot demand was not much but fear of bullish week-end figures and of a continually dwindling of supplies will cause buying.

Hayward & Clark's Cotton Letter.
New Orleans, La., March 27.—Liverpool today was disappointing was disappointed in several ways. Futures declined as much as eight points, spot prices were four lower and sales only 4,000.

As the bullish support and action on our side is yet only tentative and timid this could not fail to have a bad effect on trading here. New York lost 14 points around the opening and first trades here were at a loss of 10 points.

The spot market is reported quiet and unchanged. So far no indication of the same demand as yesterday.
