BIGGEST GOLFING EVENTS OF YEAR AT PINEHURST

Pinehurst, N. C., March 30.—The biggest golfing events of the year on the Pinehurst links began today and will continue through the week. The occasion is the 3th annual United North and South amateur golf championship tournament.

There is a record breaking entry list and a widely representative field of participants. No less than three former champions—Warren K. Wood of Chicago; George C. Dutten, of Boston; and Allan E. Lard, of Washington—are here, together with a strong field of players who have figured prominently in past events.

The tournament opens today with an eleven hole qualification round, with a gold medal for the best score of six divisions of sixteen each qualifying for the championship, president's, secretary's, treasurer's, captain's and club cups, which will be awarded to the winners of the match play rounds. The week will end with the annual open championship, open to both professionals and amateurs, in which the prizes will be the open championship gold medal and \$100, \$50 and \$25, amateurs to receive plate.
