An investigation of a three-cornered affray between Messrs. Will Stanford, E. M. Baker and J. M. Turner, which grew out of a dispute as to the fatness of a calf took up most of the time in the recorder's court this morning.

The three men were at Zeke Johnson's store on Saturday afternoon, when Mr. Stanford delivered a note to Mr. Stanford from his brother about a calf which Mr. Stanford had been feeding for him.

It seems that it was claimed that the calf had been losing flesh, and as the various charges were handed about the calf was given, and a small fight ensued, in which Mr. Turner was knocked down by Mr. Stanford. The three defendants were made to pay the cost.

W. S. Wofford, who is a store-keeper for the Southern Railway, and who sleeps in a shanty car near the roundhouse, was fined \$5 and the costs for shooting a pistol last night. The defendant claimed that some one was trying to get in his window, and that he shot to frighten him away.
