Yet he remained true to God. The secret of his fidelity was evidently to be found in the home and the character early found there.

There was a large number of young people present at the service, and the closing thought that Daniel's strength of character could be accounted for only by his decision in youth was forcibly impressed upon their minds. ## To-day's Markets

Carpenter, Baggot & Co's Cotton Letter.

New York, April 15.—Our market was favorably influenced by the better cables, heavy rainfalls throughout the belt and later by a reported cloudburst at Canton, Mass.

Shorts covered pretty freely in this market and abroad in anticipation of the holidays and unfavorable weather. This buying, however, constituted the main support to the market and after its first impulse there was an easement in prices owing to the feeling around the ring that there was still a lot of long cotton yet to come out.

As the day wore on and no signs appeared of any distressed cotton for sale the market rallied back to the highest of the day.

After the severe decline we have had of over 200 points from the top prices it would seem that a respectable rally of at least forty points was due over the extended holiday of 2 days now approaching.

Spots are holding remarkably well in the face of the decline in the future market, but the bears are as confident as ever and stand ready to sell on the advances.

**Hayward & Clark's Cotton Letter.**

New Orleans, April 15.—Advices from abroad are decidedly more cheerful. Our own correspondents in Liverpool cable that the market is over-sold. Manchester is slightly better. If stocks continue to diminish at present rate market is liable to natural squeeze, undertone better, have a good opinion. This news was supported by the action of that market. Futures due about 6 lower, came in about right but weakened towards the close on the disappointing response from New York. Spot prices are unchanged. In the fact of such advices the behaviour of our leading market is hard to account for. New York weakened badly soon after the opening and we had to follow, although feeling here is getting more friendly. Many consider present prices low enough for this time of the year. And indication towards a turn in New York would now find ready support here. Good news also came from the Carolinas to the effect that the spinners' meeting, called to consider a sixty day shut down, was called off as New England mills and other concerns would not agree to the proposition. Moderate to heavy rains occurred generally in the belt during the past 24 hours and a rejugged beneficial to the central and eastern states. Spots are lower and there is a good demand for desirable cotton and also some inquiry for lower grades. Semi-weekly receipts 19,489 vs. 26,475; shipments 28,859 vs. 37,947; stocks 392,336 vs. 359,709. Very bullish.

**Bache & Co's Letter.**

New York, April 15.—With cables not as bad as expected and a very wet map cotton opened 6 to 3 points up and commission houses were buyers on balance at the start. The market exhibited poor rallying power, however, and acted as though it weighed a ton. Local traders were bearish and sold on the rallied. A good demand for pots was again reported from the south with 10 cents bid in the interior of Alabama for middling but none selling 10 1/2 to 11 cents being asked. The market has few friends and until conditions change or it becomes oversold only moderate rallies can be looked for.
